DEATH OF MRS. STEVENS

At St. Vincent de Paul Hospital, Brockville, on Friday last, April 3, Mrs. S. J. Stevens of Athens departed this life, aged 62 years.

The news of her death came as a shock to her family and friends here. Though she had been in poor health for over a year, her bright cheerful manner in leaving for the hospital only a few days previously gave no intimation that the end was near. About 10 o'clock on Thursday evening the Sister in charge noticed a change and called the Superior in consultation who confirmed her fears. Then everything possible was done but the grim destroyer had marked her for his own and she passed peacefully away.

The maiden name of deceased was Elizabeth McArdle and she was born at Sweet's Corner. About 40 years ago she was united in marriage to Mr. Stevens and with the exception of two years spent in Westport has since been a continuous resident of Athens. Here her life has been a model of love and devotion to her family. Though mingling comparatively little with the social circles of the village, she had a very large number of friends who had been gained and held by her frank, genial manner and peculiarly happy disposition. Devoted to her home, her thought was always the interest her children, esteeming their love and obedience ample recompense for any sacrifice made.

She is survived by her husband and eight children, namely: Frank, Maurice, Marcus and Mrs. J. O'Shea, Montreal; Mrs. J. Walker, Gananoque; Mrs. Wallace Connerty, Mrs. C. Heffernan and George, Athens. She also leaves four sisters and one brother—Mrs. O'Connor of Long Point, Mrs. Donnelly of Sealey's Bay, two sisters at Grand Island, Nebraska, and John McArdle of Gananoque. To these the Reporter joins with their many sympathizing friends in extending heartfelt condolences.

All day Sunday friends from near and far called at the home of mourning to look their last upon one who had added only brightness to their lives. The casket was covered with a wealth of beautiful floral offerings. The funeral service was conducted at 10 a.m. on Monday and a large number of friends marched in procession to the church of St. Dennis where service was conducted by the Rev. Fr. Crawley. The church could not accommodate nearly all who sought admission. Following the impressive requiem service, Rev. Fr. Crawley made fitting reference to the worth of deceased as a faithful member of the Church. The remains were deposited in the vault, the pall bearers being the four sons and two sons in law, James Walker and Charles Heffernan.

AFARMERS' EXCHANGE

Brockville Times (Saturday)
For some weeks, R. B. Faith, Ottawa, has been carrying on a campaign over Eastern Ontario with the object of bringing about factory inspection of cheese; testing of weights and payment at the car, a system of cold storage, and the doing away with the present cheese boards and establishing in their place a few large boards designated "Farmers' Exchanges, or Produce Association." One of the places named for the establishment of such an organization was Brockville and a meeting to take the preliminary steps was held yesterday afternoon in the dining room of Victoria Hall. At least 150 persons were present, about half of whom were delegates from various cheese factories of this district

The others were cheese buyers, sales men, manufacturers attracted out of curiosity. These were given voice in the deliberations but no part in the voting.

After a full discussion of the question the following rules were adopted:

1. Brockville Board by-laws with amendments so that any salesman failing to get an offer at any sale for the factory he represents shall have liberty to sell off the board unless otherwise allowed by the president.

2. Board of arbitration to be a buyer appointed by the buyers, a salesman appointed by the salesmen and the instructor.

3. All cheese shall be inspected at factory previous to day of sale.

4. A detailed report of inspection dated and signed by person making inspection must be left at factory on form to be provided by the executive of the association.

5. All salesmen to produce inspector's report of cheese which he offers for sale.

6. All cheese shall be given proper care after sales until delivery.

7. All cheese shall be bought and sold for cash.

8. Payment shall be made by certified cheque.

9. Arrangements shall be made by buyers for payment by cheque through banks at point of shipment, banker to have authority to fill in amount on presentation of bill of lading.

Weights shall be tested at point of shipment by a weigher appointed by a board of representatives of factories shipping at one point.

Five boxes shall be weighed at one draught by weigher in testing.

At least one tenth of sale shall be tested.

Several delegates expressed their opinion that the formation of a board to take up the work of the Brockville Cheese Board and to trespass upon its functions was not in the best interests of the trade.

A prominent member stated to the Brockville Times that unless the Cheese Board conformed to the ideas of the new movement several manufacturers would boycott the board and ship direct to England having made arrangements accordingly.
