

London, July 30,—In the House of Commons yesterday, Secretary of War Broderick, in reply to wquestion by Col. Francis Lalfred Lucas, Conservative member for the Lowestoft division of Suffolk, repudiated the suggestion that the London Daily Mail had been excluded from the list of newspapers which received official war despatches because of its report in regard to the shooting of British wounded by the Boers after the Vlakfontein fight. Mr.Broderick added that the reason for the exclusion of the paper from access to these reports was that twice this year the Daily Mail had published information based on confidential official decuments, which both the Times and another journal, for patriotic reasons, had refused to print.

The Daily Mail this morning characterized as "baseless and mean" Mr. Broderick's assertion in the House of Commons yesterday that the paper had a habit of surreptitously buying secret War Office information, adding that if Mr. Broderick wentured to repeat outside the House that the paper had stolen official documents, it would prosecute him for hibel. In the House of Commons this afternoon, Swift McNeill, Irish Nationalist, made a motion to the effect that the Daily Mail's challenge was a bneach of the privilege of the House. The Government leader, Mr. Balfour, assembed. But, apparently hot destring to stir the matter up, he said he thought it was not necessary to press the motion. Mr. McNeill, however, insisted, and the motion was carried without a division. Mr McNeill then moved that the printer and publisher be ordered to appear at the bar of the House tomorrow. The motion was defeated by 288 to 128 wotes.

Electoral Scheme Bars all but Natives From the Island Senate.

But Will Permit the President to Be Naturalized Citizen of the Country.

Havana, July 30.-Electoral bill as drafted by the electoral commission was submitted yesterday to the constitutional convention. The measure provides for universal suffrage, but restrictions as to ability to read and write, are imposed in the case

of officeholders. Governors of provinces and provincial legislators must be of Cuban birth or have been naturalized for a period of eight years. They must be at least 30 years of age. They must possess title by public decree or have filled office by popular vote.

The same restriction regarding citizenship are laid upon congressmen, who must be 25 years of age. Sonators must be Cubans by birth and 35 years of age. Governors of provinces and provin-

ears of age. The president must be a Cuban or naturalized. In the latter case, as provided by the constitution, he must have served in the Cuban army for 10 years. He must be at least 40 years old. The same conditions apply to the

vice-president.

Senators shall the elected by provincial legislatures and an equal number

In the provincial legislatures minority representation is provided for, Havana having 20 members, Santa Clara
17, Santiago 17, Matanzas 15, Pinar
del Rio 12, and Porto Principe 8. Havana will have 17 congressmen, Santiago 13, Santa Clara 14, Matanzas

8, Pinar del Rio 7, and Porto Prin-Four senators shall represent each province. Havana will have 21 presidential

electors, Santiago 17, Santa Clara 18, Matanzas 12, Pinar del Rio 11, and Porto Principe 8. The project provides for two elec-tions. At the first will be elected governors of provinces, provincial legis-lators and senatorial electors. At the second, to be held eight days later, congressmen and presidential electors will be chosen. Thirty days after the second election the presidential elec-tors will meet in Santa Clara to elect

the president.

Y., July 31.-There were 74 deaths from small-pox in this State during the month of June, which is the largest number for any month in the history of the State, according to the records in the department of the State Board of Health. Of this number 71 deaths on belity, li relity, li rewill be asked to deal with it.
