### VILLAGE BADLY GUTTED.

One Side of Main Street Destroyed—Loss \$30,000.

St. Thomas, June 26.—The Village of Springfield, on the M.C.R. sixteen miles east of St. Thomas, suffered serious losses through fire early yesterday morning. One side of the main street was destroyed by the flames.

Chambers' departmental and hardware store, Ferris' barber-shop and residence, Lamb's general store, Postmaster Chandler's store and barn were demolished before the fire burned itself out. Total loss is \$30,000. The origin of the fire is not known. One man was caught under falling timbers and was extricated with an injured leg. The Aylmer fire brigade was called.

## WILL MAINTAIN STRIKE

Albert's Attempt to Stop Agitation in Southern France Fails.

Hopes of the Government Blasted—Difficult for the Cabinet—Clemenceau Trying to Weather the Storm—Bill For Abolition of Court Martial In Time of Peace Is Postponed—Discipline Is Lax.

Paris, June 27.—The Government's hope that the return of Marcelin Albert, leader of the wine-growers' movement, to the south, after his interview with Premier Clemenceau would result in a change of attitude on the part of his followers has been blasted. The federated committees have decided to maintain the civic strike and the "redeemer," or "apostle," as he is variously termed, has no alternative but to surrender himself to the authorities in accordance with his promise to M. Clemenceau. Nevertheless the excitement in the disturbed territory continues to subside and the Government believes that, barring some unfortunate incident which may again inflame the people, the latter will gradually come to their senses and realize that a prolongation of the present situation will only increase their misery.

The Government now apparently is quite as much concerned about the insubordinate spirit manifested among troops as the attitude of the wine-growers, for in spite of the efforts to minimize them new incidents showing the lack of discipline in the army are occurring daily. The Government seems to have awakened to the necessity of dealing sternly with the demoralization engendered by the socialistic anti-military propaganda, and the press commends the decisions of the Government to excite the mutineers of the 17th Infantry and to postpone indefinitely the bill providing for the abolition of court-martial in time of peace.

The position of the Cabinet grows increasingly difficult, and M. Clemenceau's sole object seems to be to weather the storm until the summer vacations of Parliament affords a breathing spell. To-day, when the Premier replies to the interpellation on the general policy of the Government is likely to decide whether he will be able to overcome the difficulties in his path or fail in his attempt to do so.

### Money Returned to Clemenceau.

Paris, June 27.—M. Albert yesterday gave himself up to the authorities at Mont Pellier. He received a chilly reception from crowds at Narbonne. His comrades of the committee of Argeliers have from their prison issued a statement repudiating him and declaring for a continuation of the civil strike. Later M. Albert sent this letter to M. Clemenceau:—"In two or three days you will have proof that I kept my promise. Enclosed find the 100 francs you loaned me, for which accept my thanks. As agreed, I have surrendered myself to the authorities."

### WHOLE BLOCK BURNED OUT.

One Thousand People Are Homeless—Fifty Buildings Destroyed.

Norfolk, Va., June 27.—One whole block of the fine beach section, immediately adjoining the Jamestown Exposition grounds, was swept by fire yesterday.

The big Arcade Hotel, the Berkeley Hotel, Outside Inn, Powhattan Hotel, Caroline Hotel, and several other smaller hotels and a large part of the oceanic warpath was destroyed.

The loss may run up to \$300,000; partly insured.

Between 40 and 50 structures were consumed, and probably 1,000 persons are homeless. It was learned that a negro was burned to death in one of the houses.

### Wellman For Thaw.

New York, June 27.—Tuesday was the first anniversary of the killing of Stanford White on the Madison Square Roof Garden. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw and Lawyers Daniel O'Reilly and A. Russell Peabody visited the slayer.

Walking between two other men accused of murder, Thaw laughed and joked over the printed reports of his ill-health.

From trustworthy sources it was learned Tuesday that Francis Wellman, the noted criminal lawyer, will act as chief counsel for Thaw at his next trial.

Wellman, it will be remembered, appeared for the Hynes brothers when they were on trial for murder in Toronto.

### Find Company Negligent.

Port Hope, June 27.—The inquest on Harry Wright of Toronto, the C.P.R. lineman who was killed here on Monday, resulted in a verdict that "the C. P. R. knew that the electric light company's wires were on their poles and that they were negligent in not having the current shut off while the men were working."

### Grand Trunk Station Burned.

Thamesville, Ont., June 27.—The Grand Trunk Depot, erected here by the Great Western Railway in the early fifties, was burned to the ground. The pump house was also destroyed. This was the third time the depot has been on fire during the past few weeks.

### Escape From Police Station.

Niagara Falls, June 27.—Two prisoners made their escape from a cell at police headquarters. They were two boys named Park Stewart and Cash Robinson, who had been picked up on the street as suspicious characters.

### Could Starve the West.

Calgary, June 27.—Before the beef commission P. Burns, head of the firm of P. Burns & Co., asserted that if he closed his abattoir and purchasing department for ten days, the west would starve.

The principle underlying Mr. Haldane's statement was local autonomy under the guidance of a General Staff recruited from the forces of the empire as a whole.

### Longshoremen Unsatisfied.

Montreal, June 27.—Mr. Poliquin, secretary-treasurer of the Longshoremen's Union, complains that the longshoremen were not properly treated by the Department of Labor at Ottawa with regard to the recent arbitration.

The longshoremen answered the board of conciliation without delay and they claim that the announcement of the contents of their letter before the reply of the shipping men had been sent in was unfair to the longshoremen.

The longshoremen say that this practically leaves the master in the hands of the shipping federation.

### IMMIGRATION INCREASES.

Over Forty-Four Thousand Came Into Canada During April.

Ottawa, June 27.—The total immigration into Canada for the month of April, 1907, was 44,061, as compared with 35,313 for April of last year, an increase of 25 per cent. For the ten months, July 1, 1906, to April 30, 1907, the immigration was 463,718, as compared with 424,031 for the corresponding months of the fiscal period 1906-06, an increase of 44,687 or 10 per cent.
