FASHION HINTS



LADIES' YOKE-WAIST.

Five Sizes, 32 to 40 inches bust measure.

Figured organdie, with a yoke of all-over lace was used for the waist (portrayed on this page, and green rayon silk, with a yoke of embroidered handkerchief linen. A lining is supplied with the pattern, but its use is a matter of choice. The fullness at the waist is gathered to the yoke and the closing is at the centre back. The full puff sleeves are finished with a band of all-over lace and a frill of lace edging. A high collar and full-length sleeve are provided in the pattern. White batiste with a lace yoke, and a band of lace about the sleeves with a frill of galated chiffon is a decidedly pretty suggestion. Suitable materials are preferable in making a waist of this kind, and those most favored are louisine, rayon silk, crepe de chine, batiste, law, veiling, and albatross. The pattern cut in five sizes, from 32 to 40 inches bust measure. Size 38 requires 3-1/4 yards of 32-inch goods and 3-1/4 yards of all-over for yoke and cuffs.

LADIES' WAIST.

Five sizes, 32 to 40 inches bust measure.

The separate blouse occupies an important place in every wardrobe, and the waist pictured here shows a pretty model in Alice blue louisine

with a yoke of all-over lace, and frills of edging in the sleeves. A broad box plait gives a panel effect to the front of the waist, and shirrings at the shoulder regulate the fullness at the front and back, where the closing is arranged. A choice is given between a full-length, three-quarter or short sleeve, to be finished at the edge of the puff with a band of lace and frills of lace. A trimming band outlines the lace plastron, and a frill of lace edging gives a soft finish to the cuff of the short sleeve. Handkerchief linen, madras, rayon, peau de soie, cashmere, and albatross are recommended, and will combine effectively with French, egypt, Danish and Hedebo embroideries, all-over-lace, or medallions. The pattern is cut in five sizes, from 32 to 40 inches bust measure. Size 38 requires 3-1/4 yards of 32-inch material.
