### PEOPLE SAY "RESIGN"

But Mikado Commands Cabinet Ministers to "Stay."

Mass Meeting of the Japanese Popuace of Osaka Terms the Peace Agreement With Russia Humiliating and Hopes That It Will Be Broken-Maj.-Gen. Ovanovsky Appointed Russian Plenipotentiary.

Toklo, Sept. 12.—A mass meeting at Osaka yesterday passed the following resolution without hindrance on the part of the police.

part of the police.

"The peace that has just been concluded between Russia and Japan forfeits the fruits of victory and sows seeds of future complications and danger. The Government's high-handed and unconstitutional measure has resulted in unexpected disturbance to the peace of the city in which the Mikado resides. The Empire's honor has been soiled, and the spirit of the constitution lost. Never has our country been brought to face greater dangers. Therefore, be it

"Resolved that we hope that the humiliating peace agreement will be broken and the Government will resign."

broken and the Government will resign."

In accordance with established usages the Cabinet Minister's have presented an official statement to the Mikado, explaining the necessity of instituting martial law at the capital and at the same time asking the iminstituting martial law at the capital and at the same time asking the imperial judgment as to whether they should remain in office or retire.

The Emperor's reply, which was made yesterday, advises them to retain their respective posts.

The Russian Representative.

Godzuadani, Manchuria, Sept. 12.— Major-Gen. Ovanovsky, quarter-mas-ter-general of Gen. Linevitch's staff, has been appointed plenipotentiary to meet the Japanese representative and arrange the terms of an armistice. Komura's Illness.

New York, Sept. 12.—Last night at the Waldorf-Astoria following the consultation of physicians it was an-nounced that it is still undetermined as to whether Baron Komura will be able to start for Japan next Thursday.

MARTIAL LAW FOR SOME TIME. U. S. Minister Reports Causes and

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 12.—The following cablegram, dated September 10, from United States Minister Griscom, on the conditions in Tokio, was made public yesterday by the President:

on the conditions in Tokio, was made public yesterday by the President:

"The violence to a few foreigners, and the attacks on Christian churches, reported in my previous telegrams, should not be considered to indicate any general foreign or anti-Christian feeling. The former was quite incidental, and the latter, due to sporadic antagonism to the Russian Church and some native Christians. The mob offered to spare one American church if the minister could show an American flag; unfortunately he could not.

"Newspapers have during many months raised popular expectation so high that intense dissatisfaction with the terms of peace resulted. Sentiment among the army, navy and nobility, however, is understood to be more conservative. Six newspapers have been suspended. Martial law probably will continue for some time, thus insuring quiet. Meanwhile the legation guards of twelve soldiers will continue."

SOME POINTS TO BE SETTLED. Russia Wants Enlightment Before Withdrawing Troops.

Godzyadina, Manchuria, Sept. 12.— The peace terms became known here yesterday. The majority consider them inoffensive to Russian honor and

dignity.

It is not clear at what station the It is not clear at what station the railroad is to be turned over to the Japanese at Kwangchengtse or Chantufu. If the turn over occurs at Kwangchengtse, then Russia cedes to Japan a hundred miles of yet unoccurs. Japan a hundred miles of yet unoccupled line, and otherwise the only coal mines south of Harbin. From Chantufu start all the trade routes to the very rich Kirin Province, and should the road become the property of the Japanese to Kwangchengtse the complete possession of Chantufu would place Kirin Province entirely under Japanese influence.

This and many other questions such as the Russians' right to maintain consular officials and commercial agents at Liaoyang, Mukden, Port Arthur and Port Dalny, should, it is claimed here, be settled before the armies withdraw from their strategic positions. Over 20,000 Invalids.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 12—A despatch from Godzyadani of September 8, only a small portion of which was allowed to pass the St. Petersburg censor, says that on August 14 there were 20,560 sick and wounded officers and men in the military hospitals.

Poyner has failed to account for several hours of the night, from the time when he left the shanty until 7 the next morning. Evidence would lead to vabelief in his innocence, but local apeople who have known him express the opinion that he has not told all he knows. Corfield appears to be anxious to facilitate matters. Both men are most earnest in asserting their innocence.

Montreal, Sept. 12.—A sad case of infanticide occurred here yesterday morning, when J. Albert Martin, son of Mayor Laporte's business partner, in a sudden fit of insanity, killed his 7-months'-old child.

Martin about 7 o'clock jumped out of bed, seized the child, and strangled it with a napkin, and then threw the body on the dining table, muttering that he had sent the infant to heaven, and saved it the trouble of living. He then subsided, and submitted to arrest without a word. The body of the child was taken to the morgue.
