Memorial Service to Miss Peck.

A memorial service to Miss Annie Laura Peck Baptist missionary, who died at Vizianagram, India, on March 17th of tuberculosis, was held in College Hall last Sunday evening.

The service, which was conducted by the pastor, Rev. E. D. Webber, was opened with a hymn by the choir followed by select scripture readings by the pastor, prayer offered by Rev. Mr. Manning, and a hymn, 'Nearer my God to Thee,' sung by the College male quartette. After another hymn Dr. Chute spoke, reviewing the student life of Miss Peck, dwelling especially on the qualifications which had endeared her to the large circle of acquaintances formed during her residence here. Dr. Chute paid a high tribute to Miss Peck as a member of the community, a student and a Christian worker.

Mrs. Manning followed, dealing particularly with Miss Peck's relations to the Foreign Mission Board. She dwelt upon the eminent fitness of Miss Peck for her work, the success she had attained during her residence in India and the profound regard in which she was held by her fellow-workers.

The ladies' quintette sang, 'O, Beautiful Morning,' after which Dr. Cutten spoke impressively concerning the true estimate of life, drawing the illustration of his point by the life of Miss Peck. Another hymn and the benediction by the pastor brought to a close a service tender appropriate and impressive.

The New Town Building.

The new fire station is now about completed, and through the courtesy of Councillor Hales a representative of THE ACADIAN was shown through it one day this week. The property on which the building has been erected is at the corner of Front street and Central avenue and the location is a most convenient one. This property was purchased last autumn at a very reasonable figure. The dwelling which was on the property has been thoroughly renovated and fitted up as a double tenement. Mr. Aubrey Dakin, the town teamster, occupies the west side and the east side is rented and will be occupied as soon as the finishing touches have been completed.

The new building fronts on Central avenue and is 23,200 feet in size. It has been arranged to accommodate all the various needs of the town. A large room, 23,355 feet in size is fitted up for the use of the firemen and apparatus. This room is provided with two sets of double doors opening on Central avenue. These doors are fitted with convenient appliances so as to open readily and between them is a case in which the bell-rope from the tower above is reached. Hose trucks, ladder wagon and all the needed appliances are placed here ready for instant use.

At the rear of this room is the horse stable, conveniently fitted up, with a passage opening into the fire room through which the horse passes when needed. Next to this will be two cells for the lock up which are yet uncompleted but which will be made strong and sanitary. Further in the rear is a large room for the accommodation of the rolling-stock of the town, including the watering-car, tar-wagon, &c. as well as provision for storing the steam-roller and engine.

Over the firemen's room is a large room which will be used as a work shop. Here are stored all the tools and supplies belonging to the different departments, and provision is made for the doing of the various kinds of work required. In the rear of this is the store-room for hay and grain with convenient arrangement for feeding, &c. The building is also fitted with a bell-tower and a tower for drying hose.

The whole arrangement is most complete and the building is a credit to the town, and to the business ability of those who conceived and carried out the arrangements which made the scheme a success. Councillor Hales informed THE ACADIAN that the whole cost of the property would not exceed \$2500. Mr. Ernest Eagles has had charge of the work and has done a most satisfactory job.

Tidal Power.

A weeks ago it was widely noted in the papers that a great invention had been worked out to develop power from the head or water created by the rise and fall of the tides. The chief idea was, however, to have a small auxiliary reservoir to serve during the time when the falling or rising tide is without power. This would occur four times in about twenty-four hours, or during two tides.

This idea has been patented, but is not a new idea to people of this locality. It has always been urged that the building of an abutment across the Cobequid river at the Town Place site would make possible the development of great power at the river. Moreover, it has been shown that by using a long creek at that point an auxiliary reservoir would be at once available to make the tidal power there generate continuous. In this way Cobequid river may be considered a reservoir of unlimited capacity on one side of the dam. On the other side the river channel as a reservoir would be at least two miles long and about four hundred feet wide, mean width.

The possibilities of such a structure in the use of tidal water to develop power, are there dormant, needing but enterprise and capital to make actualities.

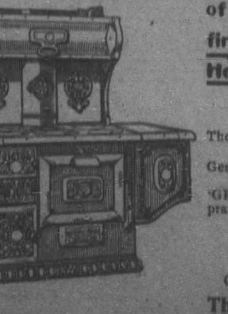

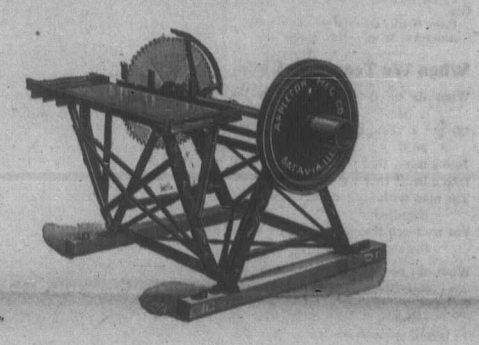
