## A GOOD MOVE

The Kings County Municipal Council came to an important decision at a special meeting held last week when it finally decided to amalgamate the three poor districts of this county. Some of us who have been watching the proceedings of the Council pretty closely were of the opinion that the necessary procedure for bringing about this change had been taken some months ago—but that is another story. The idea of thus uniting the poor districts is not a new one by any means. Many years ago the plan was entertained in many parts of the County and THE ACADIAN at different times in its history has advocated public action along this line. It was considered—and justifiably—that Kings County ought to be making a much better provision for the maintenance of the unfortunate portion of its people than it has ever done. It is hoped that now that action has been taken every possible attempt will be made to correct the evils of former days. Kings county's new home which is to be provided for the support of those among us who have suffered misfortune's unkind treatment should be such an institution as will provide in the fullest measure for those who shall occupy it in future days. It should also be an object of pride to our people and tell to those who behold it a very different tale than the disgraceful edifices that have done consistent duty as "poor houses" since the early memory of most of us.

Those who have charge of the work of constructing this commendable work should be carefully selected and devoted to the important undertaking they have in charge. Kings county can afford to be generous in its outlay for this institution—it cannot afford to longer defer making adequate and comfortable provision for the unfortunate section of its population.

## THE ELECTION

Recent statements regarding the probability of a general Federal Election this fall have received considerable interest the country over. Announcement of the dissolution of the present parliament and the date of the election are expected to be made at any time. It seems that it was Premier Meighen's intention to defer an election until after the census returns had been completed and distribution of new seats completed in order that every section of the country might be given its just representation. The clamour,

however, by the different opposing groups throughout the country has been so insistent and the need of a settled policy of government so real that he has finally decided to go to the country. No one will question the need in Canada of a thorough understanding and declaration of what is to be the policy of government for the next few years. At probably no time in the history of the country have there existed so many elements claiming the right to rule as now. The coming election will reveal this fully.

The approaching contest should be no time for party or creed bickerings, but an opportunity properly taken advantage of by patriotic citizens for such action as will in their opinion promote national welfare and the prosperity of this Canada of ours. Male and female voters alike should seek the fullest light upon the various conditions that make for Canada's best interest and be prepared when the time of recording their votes is at hand to act wisely and honestly and with proper regard to the responsibility resting upon them.

## THE GET TOGETHER SPIRIT

The other day a western town held a holiday all of its own. With funeral rites, the townsfolk buried the hammer in a mimic coffin and they celebrated "Get Together Day". It ended community discord and established harmonious teamwork.

Now, our own thriving community hardly needs a special holiday of the kind, but there is no reason in the world why we cannot celebrate *Get Together Day* every day of the year by the simple process of getting together all the time for community interests. There is nothing like the good, old community spirit of uplift, progress and helpfulness. Cohesion, the mighty power that keeps all the atoms together, may be applied here and everywhere else. Every town in Nova Scotia needs more of it. It cannot be overdone. It means everything.

By all means let us foster the get together spirit right here and be that much better off.

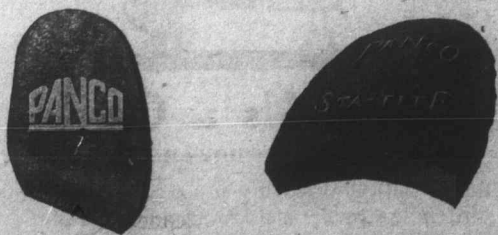
