The question that naturally presents itself is: Why did McGrath and Cashin take A. B. Morine into the Government, knowing the man's ecord? While Morine may be of some value where Mr. Coaker placed nim, as an independent, no one will ever expect a country still bleeding from the wounds inflicted by this man and his accomplices in '98 to ake him as an Executive Officer of the Crown and its Minister of Justice, what object then could be served by placing such a character in a position of great power and responsibility? There was one reason, but McGrath and Cashin have since discovered it to be but a vision.

The answer of the manly electors of Bonavista Bay to Morine's gross petrayal of his benefactor and friend who gave him his seat in the Assemply, has caused a great slump in the Morine stock. The crafty mind of he plotter in chief realizes he is too light for the job set for him. Unionsm in the great northern districts is too hard a nut for Morine to crack. In his greed and mad ambition he has grasped to catch the shadow and has lost the substance. Unable to even face the people whose respect and support he has fortified, McGrath and Cashin regard him as of no 'urther political value and his exit is but a matter of time.

Recent developments show only too clearly Morine's frame of mind n regard to the people of Bonavista Bay. However he may insult, persecute, ridicule or provoke the honest fishermen of the north all he may for the present, the days of his domination will be short and his going will not save the bunch of political timeservers who have temporary control of our public affairs. They too must pay the penalty for political deception ind rascality, and from every quarter evidence of the contempt in which hose usurpers are held, is daily pouring in.

No selfrespecting man in the community can entertain anything but lisgust at the antics of the McGrath, Morine-Cashin Government. The same old spirit of '98 is manifesting itself to-day. The 'Local Affairs Act' which was passed in 1915 and strongly supported by Morine is now to be openly questioned in order to exploit public funds for he purpose of bribing the electorate. Is it surprising then if the people should rise up and demand to have the law of the land administered properly and in accordance with statute law.

Let the Cashin Government attempt to defy the law and it must be prepared to accept the consequences. It is dangerous business for Mc-Grath, Morine or Cashin to interfere with the right of the free people of
