

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Subagency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, the state of the conditions of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a fair of at least 50 acres solery owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alorgside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take are \$35 per acre. Duties—Must cleic six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500,000.

## SAVED BOTH.

The editor was revived and was driven home, where it was found that his left shoulder had been dislocated. Mr. Poole did not sustain any damage.

## GOING SOUTH.

Lieut. Shackleton Sails For the Antartic Seas.

Victoria, B. C., June 3.—To look for islands believed to exist and to plant the British flag on each is the business on which the exploring steamer Nimrod, which took Lieut. Shackleton's expedition to the Antarctic, has sailed from Sydney, according to a despatch received by the steamer Makura.

Lieut. Shackleton says the present cruise is to complete the Antarctic work by a search in the sub-Arctic for several islands, the existence of which is doubtful.
