PENALIZING BRAINS IN UNIVERSITIES
(Boston Globe)
A western university, in excellent standing, has served notice that hereafter it will engage no married instructors unless they are possessed of independent means.

The institution is quite frank about it. The Dean explains that salaries \$35 or \$40 a week, while quite as princely as the stipends paid in other universities for the same grade of service, are inadequate to keep up the scale of living expected of a college instructor.

This candor at least is refreshing. It recognizes that the university cannot, or does not pay what is, for a married instructor, a living wage, and must obtain such labor either by imposing bachelorhood or else by sponging on the independent incomes of such as are fortunate enough to have them.

This difficulty is one commonly recognized among young college instructors. It is sometimes met by their arranging marriages with women—or girls—of means, the woman getting the social position of a professor's wife, and the man the money. The moral elevation of such a match is self-evident.

Beyond the personal aspect of this situation lies the social one. The underpayment of the whole teaching profession, from college to primary grades in the public schools, is notorious. The teaching profession ranks as probably the most vital in any civilized society. Niggardliness in rewarding it is its own comment.

BILL SHARON WON AT POUGHKEEPSIE

Tom Murphy Drove N. B. Animal to Win in Three Straight Heats.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Aug. 23—Four heats were required to decide "The Knickerbocker" 2.05 class trot, purse \$2,000 at the opening of the four day meeting of the Grand Circuit at the Hudson River Driving Park today. King Watts, driven by A. McDonald, won the event by taking the two last heats after the first had gone to The Great Volo, piloted by Walter Cox, and the second to Legal J. piloted by Warman.

Herbelyn, veteran of the half-mile tracks, lost to The Great Volo by a head in the first heat. In the second Legal J. broke at the finish but crossed the line a length ahead of King Watts. The third heat was captured by King Watts only after a close brush with Princess Etawah in the stretch while the fourth came in an easy win over The Great Volo in the last quarter after Legal J. which led previously broke twice.

Peter the Brewer in straight heats won the 2.21 class trot. The 2.21 class trot went to Bill Sharon, Tom Murphy up, in straight heats without competition. After dropping the first heat of the 2.10 class pacer to The Sherwood in a neck and neck drive Robert Direct annexed the last two heats easily.

PRESERVE THE FORESTS
The preservation of the Canadian forests is one of the most important national needs, as it is most essential that a proper crop of timber shall be assured in perpetuity commensurate for the requirements of the home and foreign markets. The list of "Don'ts" for those who visit the forests has been given wide publicity, yet despite all the preventative urged the fires in the forests keep recurring with most unpleasant frequency. The United States, Great Britain and other large nations are all very keen in the upkeep of forestry development, and authorities are agreed that an extension in this direction is wise economy. Natural reforestation methods are as good as any and the most economical in the end, so that a wise policy for Canadians to pursue is to take a common share in the preservation of our huge belts of timber lands and pertinaciously see to it that nature is not handicapped in any way through the reckless carelessness of adventurers and others who have no stake or interest in the Dominion. Canada is richly endowed by nature with a wealth of timber lands, and it is very necessary therefore that this common heritage must be preserved by compelling holidays-makers, campers and others to exercise more thoughtfulness by exhibiting a reasonable appreciation of their personal responsibility in a national matter of such overwhelming importance. "Preserve the forests" is a good enough Canadian slogan for every day in the year, says the Montreal Gazette.
