Well, let our honorable members go a little further and rive Paddy an ice house to keep the bog water cold for us, or we will have o salt it in the casks. The Plainlealer says it gives all the fishermen latisfaction except a few sore heads. But it is only soreheads that I see use Paddy's water. All the sound heads get all the pure spring water they want on the "rock." as we call it about fifty or sixty yards from where our boats are anchored during the rap fishing season in Western Cove. where our fathers before us got their supply of pure wholesome water a nundred years ago.

If the hon, members would give us about 100 feet of hose and two barrels of cement we could fill our casks without taking our dories ashore. The water pipes in Golden Bay are all bosh," and it's the worst kind of bog water, the color which resembles "strong tay," hardly fit to use But he has the pipes done "nate hey go near his own stage

Paddy is netitioning for a post of fice in Golden Bay on the strength of the fishermen because he keeps an odd letter that may stray there during the five weeks of the trapping in Western Cove. He and his father did it for the past 90 ears and never looked for nor got one cent for it, nor never got any Jovernment pap. He was born in Golden Bay 68 years ago. But then, what about the trappers and trawlers that resort Cape Cove? Will the members give them a post office and water pipes there?-more wanted there than craft anchored there in one day than in Golden Bay in one year.

Every Saturday they are in from all parts of the ground for their weekly supply of water and what letters that come through the lighthouse mail for them. Even the trap boats of Golden Bay have to run around there for shelter. ## Value of Experiment In Developing Resources of a Country.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor,-It is rather early to send you a section of the Log of the Strathcona, but seeing that the question of developing this Colony from an agricultural standpoint-has been so much discussed of late, I am

venturing to trespass on your time. Ever since we left St. John's I have been hearing of the poor fishery—the few quintals taken in traps—and at any rate in some parts the poor catches of salmon and lobsters. presume no question is more freely discussed now by those who love Newfoundland than the question of whether there is any real agricultural future for Newfoundland. A gale of wind we met in Bonavista Bay absolutely drove the Strathcona back, and we spent two days in Catalina, where lay a large fleet of fishing schooners, some of whom had been waiting already two weeks to get waiting already two weeks to get north. There seemed a general feel-ing of depression—but when one alluded to agriculture the consensus of opinion seemed entirely pessimistic Newfoundland will never be any use for agriculture," was prevailing opinion and I regret to say that it is the attitude assumed by many towards the policy of spending

money in trying to foster it. Mr. Editor, I have always been an advocate of at least trying to develop the resources of the land, much as I believe in and love the sea and those who go down it to reap its rich harvests. But, sir, as in medicine and surgery, so exactly in agriculture and I believe in Pisciculture also, I lament deeply the economy

Which Spares Outlay on Scientific Fishery Work. If advances are to be made, nay, if the old standards of success are to be maintained outlay in life and money must be made. Black death, plague, malaria, yellow fever, diphcerebro-spinal meningitis, have lost their terrors before the advance of medicine. Countless tum-ors, deformities, injuries, and even brain affections no longer rob us of hope as a result of the unselfish, selfsacrificing work of surgeons and men of science. Because Newfoundland doesn't grow wheat to-day, it is ante-diluvian to argue no wheat can ever be produced that will grow, Because to-day you can't ripen good fruit on the French Shore no one with an intellect abreast of the times dare argue such fruit harvests are not possible when the right fruit trees are produced. The best prayers in men's hands to-day are those that take form in effort, and the mir-acles the modern world looks for are

to be wrought by patient persever-ance in well doing. I am writing you, sir, from Canada Bay, where last year I began some experiments with hardy seeds and be gan breaking ground for the experi-ments, exactly as we did at St. Anthony. The experiments last year cost over \$1,000 in cash, and the re-turns would be measured nearer in cents than dollars. This year we de voted again over \$1,000 to experinenting along similar lines. seeds we are using have come from Alaska and Siberia, as well as from the Canadian North-West and the United States of America, and England. It is far too soon to give any forecast as to what the results will be Recause one nationt sate well.

Justified in Arguing it is a "Cure All." I have already spent of \$20,000 on the domestic reindeer experiment: I be lieve in it absolutely and more and more as the years go by. But it has still innumerable critics whose opin-ions die hard. We are a remarkably conservative people, and to my mind do not appreciate at any where near do not appreciate at any where near their true worth the possibilities of science, if one is to judge by the criticism meted out to attempts to adapt other methods than our own to our fisheries and the development of our country. tremity anything approaching the assistance we demand for those we love ourselves, received bitter criticism. One must endeavour to cultivate the hide of a pachyderm, and "gang one's gait," as the Scotchman says. Let us not forget that it has been well said that the world consists of two sets of men; those who try to do things, however badly they succeed, and those who stay at home and criticise them for not trying some other way. Newfoundland has been, and I with the rest, applauding the feats of courage and endurance that took Commander Peary and his Newfoundland crew to the geographical Pole, little or no notice has been taken of a polar discovery which in all probability will mean more to our fellow countrymen of the future than all reflected honor accruing for the honorable part played by her seamen even in these peril-ous expeditions. I refer especially to Prof. Hansen's unwearving and

in his endeavour to discover The North Pole of Alfalfa.

There must be a number of your readers, sir, who are not aware rich fodder, of its capacity for gatherbe cut as many as nine times in a single season, that it will grow 12 feet in height, and that it is a great soil producer, actually making soil by breaking up land with powerful roots, and so worked out lands. While still more are unaware that at the University of Kansas one of the research Profes-sors of Industrial Chemistry has succeeded in extracting abundant dia-stase and making it into bread, which I have had the privilege of tasting. This enterprising University has sent down this year one of its similar research professors to study the products of the ductless glands of marine mammals. It has long been known that the little ductless gland attached to the kidney scoretes a fuice of immense value, which is called "adnephrin" or "adrenalin," the demand for which has added immensely to the profits of the great slaughter houses. But recently it has been further shown that a certain small gland, no larger than a pea in man, which resides under the centre of the brain in a special boney case, prowhich controls the blood pressure control, from the gland along the

kidney. It is quite possible that especially in the huge mammals like our killed on this coast, this and other invaluable chemicals may reside which will yet throw into the shade the returns from oil and manure. Weidlein has arrived to start his experimental work this summer.
