The Evening Chit-Chat

There is a certain form of selfishness or thoughtlessness — hee — hee — hee — that irritates me more every time I run up against it.

It is the selfishness of the women — I mean the women of leisure, who manage their affairs so as to travel on the trolleys at rush hours.

I think such a person has no right to a seat or to consideration of any kind.

It fairly makes my blood boil when I see a woman, who, by her general appearance, I am very sure has been on a pleasure or shopping excursion, get on a crowded car at the rush hour and accept a seat from a man who has evidently been working all day, and who according to my way of thinking, has twice the right she has to that seat.

I thoroughly believe in chivalry, but I think it should have a basis of justice and there is no justice in such a proceeding. The idea of chivalry is that the strong should help the weak, and the man who has been working at the top of his strength all day is no stronger than the lady who has been amusing herself.

Another street car offender that I have no use for is the woman of either the working or the leisure class who always goes and stands ostentatiously in front of whatever males dare to be seated while she is standing.

Receiving a seat under these conditions seems to me like receiving a gift or an invitation after many hints. Myself, I would rather stand all night than get a seat that way.

Whether it is too conspicuous for a young girl to rise and give her seat to an elderly man or woman while men are sitting, is a question of trolley car ethics that I have occasionally heard discussed.

It seems to me that if the men have been given a chance to rise and have not availed themselves of it, it is quite the kind and proper thing for a young girl to offer her seat to an elderly woman. I don't like to see her do it for a man, though, because I have an idea that the mental discomfort he undergoes in realizing that he has reached the point where he needs to accept such a thing from a woman, often counterbalances the physical comfort he gets from the seat.

In the same way I am very chary how I offer my seat to a woman not much older than I am. I think she is quite apt to resent the interference the action conveys as to be pleased by it.

I shall never forget my own feelings on a similar experience some years ago. I had been under terrific mental and physical strain and probably looked twice my age, but I could not help instinctively resenting it when I was sharply reminded of the fact by a girl hardly younger than I was who insisted on my taking her seat.

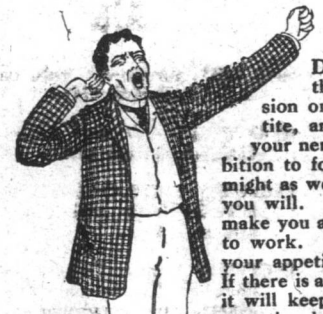

Western Cove Notes.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I noticed in the Plaindealer, June 4th, the ingenious job of engineering done by Paddy McDonald in laying down a few fathoms of water pipe for the benefit of the fishermen in supplying them with pure bog water. Well, let our honorable members go a little further and give Paddy an ice house to keep the bog water cold for us, or we will have to salt it in the casks. The Plaindealer says it gives all the fishermen satisfaction except a few sore heads. But it is only soreheads that I see use Paddy's water. All the sound heads get all the pure spring water they want on the "rock," as we call it, about fifty or sixty yards from where our boats are anchored during the trap fishing season in Western Cove, where our fathers before us got their supply of pure wholesome water a hundred years ago.

If the hon. members would give us about 100 feet of hose and two barrels of cement we could fill our casks without taking our dories ashore. The water pipes in Golden Bay are all "boob," and it's the worst kind of bog water, the color which resembles "strong tea," hardly fit to use. But he has the pipes done "nate," they go near his own stage.

Paddy is petitioning for a post office in Golden Bay on the strength of the fishermen because he keeps an odd-letter that may stray there during the five weeks of the trapping in Western Cove. If the hon. members grant the post office let them do justice and give it to John Power, who took care of the fishermen's mail. He and his father did it for the past 90 years and never looked for nor got a cent for it, nor never got any Government pay. He was born in Golden Bay 68 years ago. He kept up roads and bridges, and so did his father. They never got paid for doing so. That is what they told us. Now give the post office to John Power if it is to be put there. But then, what about the trappers and trawlers that resort Cape Cove? Will the members give them a post office and water pipes there—more wanted there than in Golden Bay, for there are more craft anchored there in one day than in Golden Bay in one year.

Every Saturday they are in from all parts of the ground for their weekly supply of water and what letters that come through the lighthouse mail for them. Even the trap boats of Golden Bay have to run around there for shelter. Let the hon. members put the telegraph at the Cape and do justice to one and all and fulfill some of their election promises.

The North Pole of Alfalfa.

There must be a number of your readers, sir, who are not aware of the marvellous possibilities of this rich fodder, of its capacity for gathering nitrogen, of the fact that it can be cut as many as nine times in a single season, that it will grow to 12 feet in height, and that it is a great soil producer, actually making new soil by breaking up land with its powerful roots, and so restoring worked out lands. While still more are unaware that at the University of Kansas one of the research Professors of Industrial Chemistry has succeeded in extracting abundant diastase and making it into bread, which I have had the privilege of tasting. This enterprising University has sent down this year one of its similar research professors to study the products of the countless glands of marine mammals. It has long been known that the little ductless gland attached to the kidney secretes a juice of immense value, which is called "adrenalin" or "adrenalin," the demand for which has added immensely to the profits of the great slaughter houses. But recently it has been further shown that a certain small gland, no larger than a pea in man, which resides untroubled in the brain in a special bony case, produces a still more valuable excretion, which controls the blood pressure control, from the gland along the kidney.

It is quite possible that especially in the huge mammals like our whales, killed on this coast, this and other invaluable chemicals may reside which will yet throw into the shade the returns from oil and manure. Prof. Weidman has arrived to start his experimental work this summer.
