Those Grants on Disputed Territory.

On Wednesday we drew attention to a report of an interview with Premier Gouin of the Quebec Province on the Labrador boundary dispute.

We drew attention to the fact that during the time Mr. Kent was acting Attorney General a proviso was drafted by him for insertion in such grants, making it clear to the Licensee that the Government did not guarantee any title, and that they were not attempting to grant a title which might prove invalid.

Yesterday it was pointed out to us that Mr. Kent called the attention of the Government to the matter by asking the following questions on Feb. 15th, 1910, in the House of Assembly.

Mr. Kent gave notice that he would, on to-morrow, ask the Hon. Minister of Agriculture and Mines to lay on the table of the House a copy of the form of Grant, lease or license of land for timber or other purposes on the Labrador, and to state whether there is or is intended to be contained or inserted in such grant, lease or license any proviso or other condition regarding the result of the pending dispute over the boundary between the jurisdiction of the Government of Newfoundland and that of the Dominion of Canada or the Province of Quebec, and to lay on the table of the House a copy of any such proviso or condition.

The answer given was that no such proviso was being inserted, and a form of the grant was tabled, which did not contain such a proviso.

As we pointed out yesterday it was current talk after these grants were issued by the present Government, that the licensees intended to make claims against the Government should the grants be invalidated by the Quebec boundary decision.

According to Sir Lomer, one of the chief reasons why a hasty settlement is urgent is the fact that people in Newfoundland are selling limits to English capitalists and others. These limits are in the debatable territory, and it is more than likely that some of them are the property of the Quebec Government, and it will be found when judgment is given that the purchasers are paying their good money for lands to which they will be unable to establish a claim.

Supreme Court.

The King vs. A. W. Bishop. Hutchings, K. C., Deputy Minister of Justice, moves for a postponement on the grounds that the Crown is not ready to proceed, and moves that the cause be heard on June 14th, at 11 a.m. R. A. Squires on behalf of Warren, K. C., consents, and it is ordered that the case be set for Friday next at 11 a.m.

William G. Dryer, et al vs. The Newfoundland Clothing Factory, Ltd. Kent, K. C., for plaintiff moves for a day. Mr. Higgins, for defendant, moves for a day in October and reads affidavit in support of said motion. It is ordered that the case be set for the witness week in the October term. The court then adjourned till tomorrow at 11.

The Police Court.

Two drunks were discharged. In the Central District Court several civil cases were disposed of, the defendants in most cases allowing judgment to go by default.

Solitary Confinement

Man Who Sent a Bomb is Meted Out Salutary Punishment. Pittsburg, Penn., June 1.—William D. Pastorious was sentenced in Criminal Court here to-day to serve not more than six years and less than four in solitary confinement in River-side penitentiary after being convicted of sending a bomb to Alexander R. Peacock, former partner of Andrew D. Carnegie and millionaire capitalist, and attempting to extort \$5,000 from him. Before being taken into Court Pastorious sent for his attorney, A. C. Stein, and denied a report that he knew of a plot to assassinate President Taft.

No Answer to Our Challenge. Beaten to a frazzle on the question of the existence of a secret compact, the Plaindealer man manufactures falsehood about Dr. Lloyd being directed to deny its existence. The measure of this falsehood may be estimated by the fact that we had no communication with any liberal member of the House or any other prominent liberal since the publication of the Plaindealer on the 31st ult., and Tuesday last, when our last reply was published.

We repeat (1) No draft of any compact was submitted and discussed in the Telegram Building last January; (2) No meeting was arranged between Kent, Clift, Bond and Coaker, either to initiate, discuss or finalize terms of any alliance, or between Coaker and any one of them.

Editor Lloyd did not meet Mr. Coaker to discuss any such draft last January, and to return to the latest fake of the Plaindealer, Editor Lloyd did not discuss with any liberal, or anybody else, whether a reply to the article of the Plaindealer under reference should be published.

Lastly we call the attention of the Plaindealer man again to our challenge to publish in full particulars of the secret compact, which he falsely declares he possesses. What he has published so far has been false and imaginary. We are still waiting to see what he can invent further in this direction.

Professor Cramb On Our National Courage.

In view of the Titanic disaster Professor Cramb spoke on national courage at Queen's College. He said:— "What is the distinction of English courage? What is it that marks it from the courage displayed, say, by a French squadron or by a German regiment on the field of battle? The question is not difficult to answer. English courage has maintained its distinctive character throughout the fifteen centuries of our possession of these islands. All our battles, from the Winwaed and Brunanburh to Crecy, Blenheim, Meane, and Paardeberg, present the same features—absolute valour in action; that is to say, disregard of danger when a great end is to be attained by that disregard; and, in speech, a definite leaning to the under-statement, born of an attitude towards danger, and perhaps towards life itself, of seriousness tempered by irony.

The Police Court.

The English trooper riding out to Coloaso to his death, and calling to a comrade, 'So long, sonny; meet you at the Day of Judgment,'... found its counterpart almost to the letter in the parting of one of the lifeboats as it stood off from the doomed liner. This courage is essentially English; it is the Viking courage; not a spendthrift, reckless valour; not the valour dear to lady novelists, which rushes into the tempest because it is a tempest; but the valour which is daunted by no peril if an end is to be gained whether that end be the conquest of a Roman province or vengeance for a personal wrong. Rightly or wrongly, wisely or insanely, we desired speed and still more speed; and in our lust for speed we ran the risk open-eyed and with full knowledge, deliberately crossing the iceberg zone in the ice-berg season with slugs that every man of us knew to contain lifeboats for less than half or even a third, of their human freight. The German Press of the past week has colourfully denounced us as betrayed by our infatuation for sport into 'living dangerously.' We abide the accusation. It is assuredly nearer the truth than the taunts of degeneracy which General Bernhardi the most distinguished writer on military subjects of all Germany, lavished on us five weeks ago."

Finally he was asked to multiply 75,987 rupees, 10 annas, and 6 pie by 9,787, and gave the correct answer in five seconds.

New 500 Mile Record.

Indianapolis, May 31.—Driving a National car for the entire distance at a rate of speed of 78.72 miles an hour, a new world's record, "Joe" Dawson yesterday won the 500 mile race and the prize of \$20,000. His time for the distance was 6 hours, 21 minutes and 6 seconds. Tetzlaff, driving a Fiat car, was second, in 6 hours, 31 minutes, 29 seconds, and Hughes, in a Mercer, was third, in 6 hours, 34 minutes, 56 seconds.

Good as Dawson's performance is it seemed until the last four laps of the race that an even better mark would be set for the event by Ralph De Palma. This driver, in a Mercedes, led at the 490 mile mark by eight minutes, having made an average of more than 80 miles an hour for the distance. Just as De Palma was entering the third from the last lap of the race his car developed cylinder trouble that could not be remedied and he was forced to abandon the contest.

Twenty four cars started in the race but only nine finished. Several of the drivers had narrow escapes. "Bob" Burman was running well up among the leaders when in the 158th lap a wheel of his Curtiss car collapsed on a back turn and the machine turned completely over. Burman's head and hands were lacerated, but he will be able to drive again in a week.
