To Speak or Not to Speak.

"Miss." Somehow I imagine her a stern young aunt, who looks with disfavor upon the way her married sister "spares the rod and spoils the child."

Seriously, the little note opens up two subjects about which I have often thought. First, a corporal punishment good for children? Second, at what age should discipline begin?

It's quite a while, isn't it, since I had a symposium of my reader friends views on any subject. How is this for a chance to start the ball rolling again? This is a subject upon which almost all women and some men are likely to have very decided opinions. Let's have them. Maiden aunts and mothers of twelve, fathers, and even old bachelors who have ideas on this subject, are urged to contribute their theories and experience.

To start the discussion, here are a few of my humble opinions.

As to whether corporal punishment is advisable or not; it seems to me the only answer to that is—that depends. There are some children who can be managed without corporal punishment and some children who simply cannot. It is a matter for study.

is such a terrible thing as some people consider it. To me it is infinitely better than some other forms of discipline such as frightening or threatening a child. I don't believe in spanking. I think the average mother's spanking simply makes a child mad and doesn't hurt it very much. A switch is both better and easier. If you are going to make pain the punishment of misdeeds, be sure you really inflict pain.

Never punish a child when you are angry. That's too much like revenge. Make him realize that the whipping is a consequence of his misdeeds, not your way of avenging yourself for the trouble he has caused.

The word consequence reminds me that the very best punishments to my mind, are those which fit the sin. A mischievous little boy had a trick of pulling his baby sister's hair. Spanking did no good. One day his mother punished him by pulling his hair; that eventually cured him.

The age at which discipline should begin is a vital question. I know a mother who thinks it is very strange that she cannot control her child despite repeated punishments. She forgets that up to the time he was two years old she made no attempt at discipline, and that, during that time, his naturally strong will gained tremendous headway. It seems to me that as soon as a child is old enough to throw his toys down for the pleasure of seeing them brought back, he is old enough to be taught that his mother isn't going to do that and to be disciplined if he persists.

What do you think? Let's have a real nice chat about it.

Household Notes.

To test the freshness of eggs hold them, one at a time, to a bright light. If they are fresh the yolks will show clear. If an egg will float in water, it is a sure sign that it is old.

Rancid butter can be sweetened by melting it, then skim it, and place a piece of light brown toast in it. In a few minutes the toast will have absorbed the unpleasant taste and smell.

The best way to stew prunes is to wash them and soak in fresh cold water over night. In the morning, stew slowly without sugar until tender. They will be plump and well flavored.

When cutting garments from a paper pattern which you are likely to use again, it is wise to make a note on the pattern of the least amount of material from which the garment can be cut.

A wise method of deciding whether a color is becoming or not is to take a piece of material and lay it over the forehead close to the face. Then if the effect is good, it can be safely worn.

In choosing wall paper, it is safe to consider light buff advisable when the outlook is either due north or east. If the room has a south or west exposure

posured old blue or shades of green or rose are very satisfactory.

Boiled ham should be soaked for several hours in cold water to cover. Wash thoroughly, trim off the hard skin near the bone, put in a kettle, cover with cold water, heat to boiling point and cook slowly until tender.

It is necessary to air blankets and beds thoroughly in the morning air, because there is bound to be a certain amount of moisture from the body, and unless it is thoroughly aired out, the bed is not sweet and fresh and dry.

The majority of grease stains may be removed from woollens by such solvents as alcohol, ether, chloroform or gasoline. The grease will be dissolved by gently rubbing the spot with a piece of the same material dipped in one of the solvents.

When drying knitted things, care should be taken that the knitted things keep their measured shape, so it is necessary to look at them several times in the drying. When they are half dry, they should be turned and pulled by hand.

Dust is a great enemy to lace — fog is another, therefore, if precious old lace is stored away, be careful that it is protected from dust, and it should be taken out and exposed to the air from time to time before an open window on a clear day.

The children, when blowing soap bubbles or sprinkling the flowers, need a rubber apron. This can be made from an old raincoat. Round the corners, hollow out the neck, bind the edge, and attach a string to the neck and waist.

Shoulder of pork is delicious when stuffed. Buy a nice fresh shoulder, have the butcher bone it, then stuff it. Sew it up tight, roll it in a cloth and boil it two hours. Then remove the cloth from it, put it in an iron baking pan and bake it two hours.

A very important point in home dressmaking — especially in making coats and skirts, is the frequent use of the iron. Unless the seams are carefully pressed with a hot iron over a damp cloth, the garment, however well cut, will have an amateur look.

Remember when sewing on dark material by artificial light to wear a light colored apron, and spread a white cloth on the sewing table. These things will increase the light

to an appreciable extent, and the strain on the eyes will not be so great.

The best finish for the kitchen floor is usually decided by the condition of the floor. Where it is old and seamed, cover it with rag carpet with a good sized piece of oilcloth under the stove and in front of the sink. If it is a good smooth floor, put linoleum on it. An oiled or painted floor is not advisable unless there are servants to scrub it every day.

Sweetbreads spoil very quickly. They should be removed from the paper as soon as they come from the market, plunged into cold water and allowed to stand for an hour, then drained and put into boiling water, into which you have put lemon juice and salt. Allow them to cook very slowly twenty minutes; drain again and plunge into cold water, then they will keep firm and white. Sweetbread should always be treated in this way for subsequent cooking.

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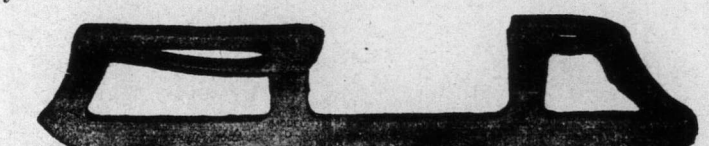
