A telegram from Petrograde to the
Morning Post's correspondent says "The Russian armies are moving forward and driving the Germans be-fore them on the Western bank of the Vistula River. The retiring Germans have Cracow behind them on which to rally. 

Slight Accident **Prompts Wise** Suggestion.


