## Driver's Head Cut Off

Automobile Race at Kalamazoo when Eleven Cars Were Piled in a Heap.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 28.—Marion Bold, of Chicago, and Jack Peacock, Brooklyn, were killed, and eight other drivers and mechanics were injured when eleven racing cars piled up in a heap at the quarter turn of the Kalamazoo Park mile track here on Friday at the gateway of the third and last auto derby in this city. The overturning of the Sunbeam 12, driven by Peacock, as it rounded the first turn of the second mile, caused accident. Peacock's car struck a fence, swerving lengthwise across track and tipped over on its side. Jack officials made a desperate effort to flag the thirteen cars that were underling up from behind, but with success.

Burt's Stutz was the first to strike the wrecked Sunbeam 12. Then nine other cars piled one after another in a smoking death heap. Four of the cars were far enough in the rear to smash into the wreckage. Track officials from the track and judges' stand started for the pile, and at the same time the crowds leapt a rush from the grand stands. When the first reached the scene Arndt's headless body was found beneath the battered Stutz.

Peacock, who had his hips and thigh fractured, died immediately after reaching hospital. The fatally injured are F. E. Martine, Peacock's mechanic, who was heavily crushed, left leg broken below knee in three places; Al W. Downs, driver of Buick, head cut.

BEAUTY IN LAUGHS.



The woman with a keen sense of humor is not only a pleasure to her friends, but she is an endless source of amusement for herself.

## Your Boys and Girls.

There are a few things that every mother should know: Babies should never be held sitting up straight until they sit up of their own accord and can hold their heads erect. Children should never be "taught" to walk. They will walk quick enough of their own accord without teaching when their leg bones are strong enough. To try to make them walk before then is almost certain to cause them to become bowlegged. Noise and excitement are very bad for babies.

Babies cannot be out of doors too much during fine weather. They may safely sleep out of doors in the daytime if warmly wrapped up and sheltered from sun and wind. Fresh air tranquillizes a baby's nerves better than anything else. The weaning from the breast should be done very gradually. To change suddenly from breast milk to bottle feeding may be productive of much mischief.

Healthy babies begin to cut their first teeth between the sixth and seventh month. That occasionally they cut them earlier than this. That very late teething is usually an evidence of "rickets." That a doctor should be consulted when a baby has no sign of teeth at 10 months old.

Talking very much to infants, and inducing them to "take notice" continually, is very bad for the proper development of their brains.
