Your Boys and Girls.

There are a few things that every other should know: Babies should never be held sitting up straight until they sit up of their own accord and can hold their heads erect. To try to make them walk before then is almost certain to cause them to become bowlegged. Noise and ex-

citement are very bad for babies. Babies cannot be out of doors too much during fine weather. They may safely sleep out of doors in the daytime if warmly wrapped up and sheltered from sun and wind. Fresh air tranquilizes a baby's nerves better than anything else. The weaning from the breast should be done very gradually. To change suddenly from breast milk to bottle feeding may be productive of much mischief.

Healthy babies begin to cut their first teeth between the sixth and seventh month. That occasionally they cut them earlier than this. That very late teething is usually an evidence of "rickets." That a doctor should be consulted when a baby has no sign of teeth at 10 months old.
