### TRIUMPHAL MARCH FOR MCKAY, SHORT AND MOORE.

**NIPPER'S HR.** Last Night. (Special to Evening Telegram.) McKay, Moore and Short have had successful meetings, at Botwood, on Monday, Adam Chalk, chairman; Springfield, Tuesday, Elias Wellman, chairman; Little Bay Islands, Wednesday, Richard Anstey, chairman; Thursday, Little Bay, Patrick Burke, chairman; at each meeting the candidates received a splendid hearing and with good results. From all indications so far, the Liberal-Progressive Party will receive a very large and efficient vote. They are holding a meeting here to-night proceeding to Shoe Cove immediately after.

### CARBONAR ABLAZE FOR MOORE.

### WHAT IS A SCOUT?



### A HANDY "KETCH ALIVE" TRAP.

This trap is much better than the brutal steel traps for muskrats and gets you a better pelt for your trouble.  
Bog borrow or—(?) procure a barrel with both heads intact and in the staves cut a hole about ten inches square. Then, fasten, by means of cleats, a piece of board putting on horizontally on each side of the barrel. Now fill the barrel with water until the side-boards are just on the surface of the water. Inside place some fresh apple, carrots or like vegetables. The muskrat attracted by the smell will climb up on the outside of the barrel and jump inside to get the bait, and will be unable to get out.

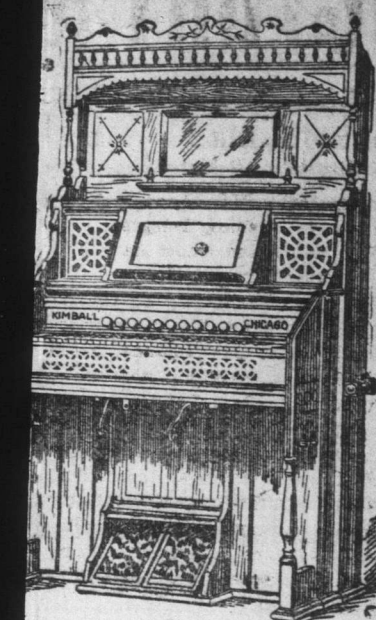
