Municipal Council.

WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. The Mayor presided and all Councillors were present.

After the preliminary business of the meeting was disposed of, the following matters were given attention: Dr. L. V. Keegan drew attention to the condition of Forest Road, which, he stated, was complained of by ambulance drivers. Orders will be given to have this road immediately repaired.

Mr. White wrote re the treatment of city streets with "Tarvia," stating from standpoint of cleanliness and preservation of streets this treatment has been most successful, the only objection to its use being from horse-owners, who find the tarred streets during this season and wet weather, very dangerous. He suggested the advisability of having the oil surface coated with fine chipped stone. At a previous meeting the Council gave instructions to the Road Department along the lines suggested. Mr. White is to be thanked for his interest in the matter.

Mr. A. Snow, Springdale Street, asked that houses on this street be numbered; that, at present, the residents are caused considerable annoyance and inconvenience owing to numbers being incorrect.

This was ordered to be attended to immediately. Inspector General Hutchings, in reply to Council's communication, re the parking of vehicles on Barter's Hill, stated that owing to the present congested condition of New Gower Street, particularly on Saturdays, the police had to order owners of such vehicles to park same on the cross streets. He also informed the Board that before long it would be necessary to pass regulations to prevent vehicles from suburbs and nearby outposts parking on such streets as New Gower and Duckworth Streets.

The City Engineer pointed out the necessity of piling certain places on the Southside Road. It was ordered that specifications be prepared and tenders called for same.

It was ordered that the Avalon Telephone Company be communicated with and asked to have the telephone poles moved back to new street line, as in their present position they are dangerous to vehicular traffic.

The Plumbing Inspector reported during the week notices had been served on several house owners to install sanitary appliances, and that many already notified had complied with the regulations.

The following plans were approved: M. James (extension) Cookstown Road; B. Manuel (extension) Freshwater Road; Mr. A. Dawe, Alexander Street must submit ground plan before his application for permission to erect dwelling can be given consideration.

Health Officer Brehm reported four cases of Diphtheria and five Scarlet Fever.

Report on City Tax Collections, amounting to \$2515.00, for the week was tabled. In this connection notice has been served on all persons who have not yet paid, requesting immediate settlement, and the Solicitors are getting after delinquents.

The reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, etc., were read, accounts presented ordered paid. The meeting then adjourned.

To prevent a scum from forming on starch which must stand for a while after made, sprinkle top of starch with cold water.

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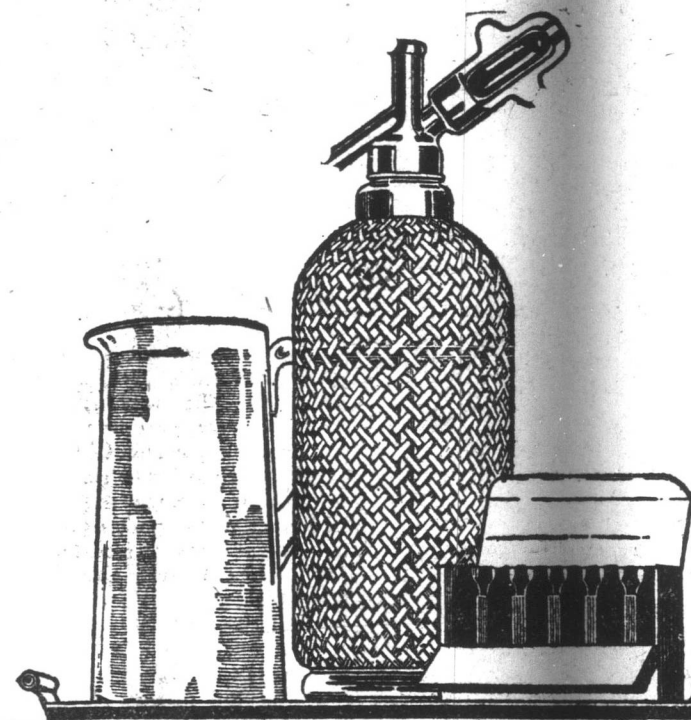
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
