

### Earthquake Survivors Are Threatened With an Outbreak of Cholera.

#### First Shipment of Supplies for Japan is on the Way--Wheat Crop in Manitoba Below the Average--A Clash Between Italy and Greece May be Averted.

#### ITALIAN DISPUTE WILL LIKELY END IN PEACE.

PARIS, Sept. 7. The League of Nations Council of Ambassadors, after considering the Italian proposal announced upon adjournment, has decided that the decision would be kept secret pending despatch of a note to the Greek Government, copies of which will also go to the League of Nations Council at Geneva. At the conclusion of the session the Italian Ambassador told the newspaper correspondents that the Council's decision was quite satisfactory and it would probably be acceptable to the Greek Government should Greece accept the Council's demands.

#### REPORTED CHOLERA AMONG EARTHQUAKE SURVIVORS.

LONDON, Sept. 7. Central News despatch from Kobe yesterday, says it is reported that cholera has broken out in Yokohama, this is probably true, since the people are drinking muddy water from the pipes and eating foul food to stave starvation.

#### NEWS OF RUSSIA WITH FOOD SUPPLIES FOR EARTHQUAKE AREA.

VICTORIA, B.C., Sept. 7. Two hundred tons of supplies from Canada for the earthquake stricken people of the Empress of Russia left yesterday for Japan. The cargoes consist of flour, salmon, canned goods and other articles. The Empress of Russia will be the first steamer to bring relief supplies to reach Japan from the American continent.

#### WHEAT CROP BELOW THE AVERAGE.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 7. Manitoba wheat crop will end up an average of thirteen bushels per acre as compared with six-

teen bushels over a ten year period, it was estimated to-day.

#### RUSSIAN RIGHTS OVER WRANGLER NOT PREJUDICED.

#### FIRE IN COVELDA, SPAIN, DESTROYED NINETY HOUSES.

MADRID, Sept. 7. Telegrams to-day say ninety-two houses have been destroyed by fire at Covella. Scarcity of water and antiquated fire fighting methods are blamed for the extent of the loss.

#### FUR PRICES RANGE HIGH AT BIG AUCTION SALE.

MONTREAL, Sept. 7. Two and a half million dollars worth of furs were auctioned off here this week. In a four-day September sale of the Canadian Fur Sales Company, which ended here this afternoon, record prices were received for Canadian Beaver, Silver Fox and Martin pelts.

#### FIRST MESSAGE FROM STRICKEN TOKIO.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7. Telegraphic communication between Tokyo and Kobe have been reopened and one of the first messages sent over the reestablished line was that most of uptown Tokyo was saved.

### Egyptian Affairs.

British martial law, which had been in force since 1914, was abolished on July 5, and an Egyptian statute substituted for possible emergencies. At the same time 250 political prisoners were released and political deportees were given permission to return. An indemnity act retained for the British certain military reservations, such as the Royal Air Force



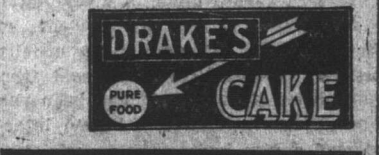

base at Abukir, pending a final settlement. The protracted trial before a military court of thirteen persons accused of conspiracy to murder British officials came to an end on July 20. On appeal sentences were confirmed as follows: Five condemned to death, one to life imprisonment, one to fifteen years penal servitude, one to ten years, one to five years, and one to three years. Two sentences of five and three years penal servitude were quashed, as was also one of twelve lashes.

The Egyptian Government on July 15 recalled from Jeddah on the Red Sea the famous caravan, with its thousands of pilgrims escorting the "Holy Carpet" to Mecca, which is sent every year by the Egyptian Government as a gift to the tomb of Mahomet. This action was caused by the refusal of King Hussein to permit the medical party safeguarding the health of the pilgrims to enter his territory.

### Will Teach Fundamental Safety Course.

#### CHICAGO SCHOOLS WILL IN- STRUCT SCHOLARS IN AC- CIDENT PREVENTION.

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—Systematic class room work in safety education for every child in the public schools is Chicago's plan in the nation-wide campaign to check the mounting toll of accidental death and injury. A plan for schooling in accident prevention, safety methods, and first aid activities drawn by a committee appointed by Superintendent of Schools Peter A. Mortenson will be put into practice in the elementary schools at the opening of the Fall term.

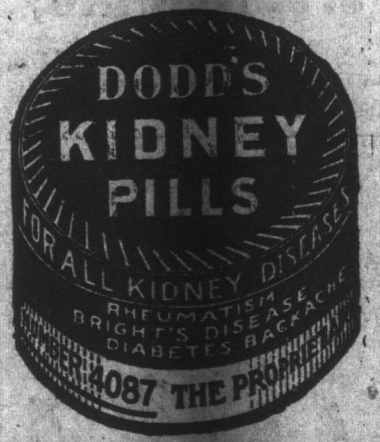
Safety, education through slogans and jingles, class room games, themes, dramatization and debates is a part of the plan. In addition, an effort will be made to relate accident statistics with the students' work in arithmetic, grammar and geography. "Experience in several cities has shown," Mr. Mortenson said, "that safety education in the schools has been the most effective agency in reducing the number of accidents to children." The program approved for Chicago, and believed to be more extensive than any in use elsewhere was arranged by Principals in schools here, in co-operation with more than

50 agencies interested in the aims of the undertaking.

"It does not contemplate the addition of a school subject," Mr. Mortenson explained, "but rather the implication in several subjects of concern for the safety for children."

Separate treatment of various classes of accidents in successive months is provided. September, October and November are given respectively to street dangers, fires, and weapons; the next three months to burns and scalds, poisons and asphyxiation, and electricity; and March to June, inclusive, to falls, railway accidents, carelessness in play, and drowning. The work under each monthly classification will be graded to meet the requirements of the various ages between the first and eighth grades.

"From sense training in the kin-



dergarten to elaborate projects for study in the upper grades, there is opportunity, without serious detriment to other worthy subjects, to develop in the child attitudes and habits of thought and action that shall serve in the earlier stages to protect him from harm, and in the later stages, help him to protect others from harm," said Mr. Mortenson.
