BY ATLANTIC CABLE.

Paris, April 11—The new army bill and other extraordinary war measures create great uneasiness throughout the country, and there is much murmuring and discontent, especially in the rural districts. The press are endeavoring to allay the excitement by saying the preparations are the best guarantee of peace.

Paris, Sunday, April 12—The Moniteur publishes an official report to the Emperor by Minister Pinard, in which an account is given of the military changes which have been made since the bill for the reorganization of the army has gone into operation, and of the effect which they have had upon the country. The minister states that all the reforms introduced in the Guarde Mobile in accordance with the provisions of that bill are now completed, and he asserts that these changes have been received with popular applause almost everywhere throughout the empire. He contradicts the reports of dissatisfaction and declares that the new army law is sustained and defended by the patriotism of the French people, who thus give a new proof of their confidence in the Emperor.

Southampton, April 12, evening.—The steamship Union, from New York, 2nd inst., arrived about four o'clock p. m., and after transferring London passengers and mails, salled for Bremen.

The British brig Hermas arrived yesterday from Porto Cabello.
