The Herald believes that the telephones should yield greater revenue. They would yield a greater revenue if the telephone charges were higher. The government reduced the price as soon as it took over the system. It has been reducing the price ever Authentic Information Received since. At present the revenue covers all operating expenses, the interest upon investment, and the cost of maintenance. By maintenance is meant the keeping up of the line to a certain standard. As the province keeps the line up to that standard there is no need of charging depreciation or sinking ALLEGED INSPECTORS fund, and no telephone system, in any place, makes any such charges. The Herald denies this. Let it mention a single case.

A telephone system for the most part consists of wire, telephone instruments and switchboards. The wires and new telephones are paid out of maintenance and the switchboards are kept up to the standard in the same manner.

The province of Manitoba does not pay interest, sinking fund, depreciation or anything else but actual operating expenses.

Though the tariff in Manitoba is very much higher than in Alberta, the operating expenses are in Calgary to the effect that the prov-85 per cent. of the revenue. The operating exince is being flooded with workers sur
