Division court is being held in Dutton today, twenty-seven suits being down for a hearing.

Bishop Williams will be at St. Peter's church, Tyroneville, on Sunday morning next, at 11 o'clock.

Hogs brought 7c at Monday's delivery.

H. J. Hales informs us that he has quit buying for the present.

Building operations in the village and surrounding country promise to be very brisk the coming season.

The annual meeting of the Liberal Association of West Elgin will be held in Dutton on Tuesday, Feb. 13.

The regular meeting of the Women's Institute will be held in the town hall, Dutton, Friday, Jan. 26, at 2.30 p.m., sharp.

Miss M. Adele Thompson, A.T.C.M., is accompanist and piano soloist at the concert given in the Glencoe Opera House, Jan. 26th.

Petitions are in the various churches for signatures to be presented to the Commons for the passing of Sunday observance legislation.

Mrs. John Patterson, after spending several months with friends in town, left last week to join her husband in Bakersfield, California.

Rev. T. Albert Moore will speak in the Presbyterian church on Friday evening, February 2, in the interests of the Lord's Day Alliance.

Mr. D. Campbell, who has been leader of Knox church choir for many years has resigned and W. Hollingshead has been appointed as his successor.

Mr. N. S. McMillan, of Moosejaw, Sask., who is spending several weeks at his former home in Rodney, spent a couple of days with friends in town.

W. F. Kendall met with a painful accident while at work in the planing mill by having one of the fingers of his right hand badly mangled with a knife.

The Bishop of Huron will make his first visit to Dutton on Sunday evening next, when he will confirm a class of candidates in the Church of the Nativity. Service at 7 o'clock as usual.

During the coming summer there will no doubt be a rink built in Dutton. A canvass is now being made for stock with very satisfactory results. The shares are of the value of \$5.00 each.

The wedding of Miss Hannah Hollingshead, formerly teacher at Lethbridge, Alberta, to Mr. Elliott I. Scott, of Sault Ste. Marie, is announced for February 1, at the home of the bride-elect, Dutton.

The Library Board have decided to grant non-resident subscribers privileges not now enjoyed. In future a book marked "two weeks" will be allowed out for three weeks. Two books will be allowed on each card, with the stipulation that one be fiction and one of some other class.

Alex. McRae brought home from Saskatchewan a sample of potatoes grown by him on his farm, near the Touchwood Hills. The potatoes weigh from one to one and three-quarter pounds each, and of the fifty bushels grown by Mr. McRae, fully half of the crop was of the size of that brought to Dutton.

It has been supposed by many that maple syrup was only produced in spring, but this theory is not applicable to Dutton, at least this year, one of its progressive residents, Mr. John Kirkwood, having made a quantity in December and January, a sample of which was left by him at this office. Who can equal this?

Miss M. Adele Thompson has returned from a two weeks' visit at "Glen Hall," Glencoe.

The Public School Board appointed Dr. Paton as a member of the Public Library Board.

Miss Violet Schultz will sing at the evening service in the Church of the Nativity on Sunday next.

Col. Macbeth, of London, spent the week-end with his sisters at Wallace-town, Mrs. Whyte and Miss Macbeth.

Revival services are being held in the Methodist church, Wallace-town, and will be continued during next week.

The McIntyre block, Main street, Glencoe, has been purchased by Mr. D. J. Thompson, the consideration being \$5,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Hockin will be "at home" to their friends in the town hall this evening. The London Harpers will furnish music.

An appeal has been entered against the judgment in Turner vs. Dunwich, which was tried at the recent assize court. The appeal will be heard at Toronto within the next few days.

Mr. D. J. Thompson, District Manager for South-Western Ontario, attends the annual banquet given by the North American Life Assurance Co. directors at the King Edward, Toronto, to-day.

The consumers of ice are somewhat alarmed that on account of the mild winter they will not be able to procure their supply for the coming season. Not a pound has yet been stored, and the present prospects are very unfavorable.

The mild weather has been the means of knocking the bottom out of the egg market. The supply of fresh-laid eggs has compelled the cold storage men to put their product on the market at a much less price than they anticipated. The price has dropped to 17c, with a gradual decline should the mild weather continue.

At a meeting held last week it was decided to produce the Oratorio, "Queen Esther," as early as possible. The following committee was appointed to manage the arrangements: Messrs. Millard, Mills and Campbell, and Misses Thompson and White. The officers are: T. B. Howard, President, and Miss Cameron, secretary.

The Dunwich Board of Health met on Monday for organization, all the members present except J. E. Gow. Alex. G. Duncan was appointed chairman. On motion of Jas. Beaty, seconded by J. D. Graham, the township council was recommended to grant the free use of the fumigator to any ratepayer of the township requiring its use.

The duty of correspondents of newspapers is to furnish legitimate news or just criticism of anything of a public nature; they are not supposed to meddle with private affairs or use the paper they represent for the purpose of venting any little personal pique. To do the latter is cowardly and against the best traditions of the press. The Journal should give its Dutton correspondent a few lessons on the ethics of journalism.

The report of Detective Heenan, special agent of the Canada Southern division of the M. C. R., for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1905, shows that 95 were arrested for trespass, chiefly Italians at Niagara Falls; 23 for theft; 2 tampering with trains; 2 assaulting M. C. R. police; one pickpocket; 2 disorderly conduct on trains, and one damaging express goods. The record is the highest in Detective Heenan's experience.

The death took place at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. Peter Stalker, East Aldborough, on Thursday, of John McKay. Mr. McKay was one of the oldest residents of Aldborough, being about 90 years of age. He was born in the Red River settlement, and was brought to Aldborough by his parents when a child. He was highly respected, and had for years been an elder of the Kintyre Presbyterian church. His wife died a few years ago, and since then he has lived with his son-in-law, Mr. Peter Stalker. He leaves two sons, James M., of Harrison; John S., of Montreal, and two daughters, Mrs. Stalker, of Aldborough, and a daughter in Dakota.

A rapid change from January to an ideal April day is something unique in a Canadian winter, yet that climatic event occurred on Sunday. The light skiff of snow of the previous day was looked for in vain by the early riser, and instead there were the veritable April showers, with the fleecy clouds chasing each other across the sky with occasional bursts of sunshine. Far coats were discarded and the numerous pedestrians were quite comfortable without even the ordinary overcoat. The crows came out of their winter quarters, while some reliable citizens declared they heard the robin's cheerful chirp. Be this as it may, the day was wholly different from the ordinary January variety. In the afternoon the thermometer was playing about the 60 mark.

The death occurred at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. (Dr.) D. A. Cameron, in this village, of Mrs. Janet McCrank, from the infirmities of old age. The deceased, who was in her 89th year, was born in the historical town of Banockburn, Scotland, and at an early age came to Canada with her parents and settled in Southwold, moving shortly to Orford where she resided for over forty years. She afterwards made her home in Wallace-town for nearly twenty years, until the death of her daughter. Her husband died many years ago, and of her family of nine children, all have passed away. She is survived by one brother, Mr. James Stevenson, of Fingal. The remains were taken to Trinity church cemetery, Palmyra, on Tuesday for burial. Service was held at the home of Dr. Cameron on Monday evening, being conducted by Rev. J. Malcolm and Rev. D. Kelso.

DUTTON COUNCIL

Minutes of the council of the village of Dutton held on Monday evening all the members present except W. Ramstein.

A number of applications for the assessorship, constable and general employee of the village were read. The matter of engaging an assessor was laid over until the regular meeting in February.

Hockin—Millard—That the council accept the application of Sinclair Mater for town constable and general employee for 1906 at the same salary as he received in 1905.—Carried.

The following cheques were granted: Treasurer of Dunwich, village portion of debenture for public school, \$340.75; treasurer public school, balance of levy for 1905, \$926; Toronto Globe, advertising debentures, \$1.92; D. C. Lamley, poll clerk at municipal elections, \$2.

The council interviewed the Electric Light Co. with regard to renewing the contract for street lighting and the supplying of additional lights. The present franchise expires in October, 1909, and the company was unfavorable to granting the new lights, asked by the council, unless a five-year contract and the extension of the franchise were granted.

McFarlane—Millard—That this council agree to accept from the Dutton Electric Light Co. the present light as placed on the streets and six additional 32 c.p. incandescent lights, to be located as per former resolution, at the following rates per year: Arc lights, \$50; incandescent, \$16, and that the reeve and the clerk be authorized to enter into an agreement to this effect with the said Electric Light Co. for a term of five years.—Carried.

The council adjourned to meet on Feb. 5.
