THE COUNTY

Happenings in Elgin During the Past Week

Aylmer will celebrate May 24th.

The head office of the West Lorne Wagon Co. has been changed from West Lorne to Toronto.

Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Knight, of Aylmer, celebrated their golden wedding recently.

Horatio Johnson, for many years a resident of Yarmouth, died in the House of Industry, aged 92 years.

Mrs. H. Barrett, Port Burwell, had her hands terribly burned Sunday morning as a result of lighting the fire with kerosene.

W. H. Ritter, of Eagle, delivered a load of hogs, five months old, to McLandress & Leitch, of West Lorne, which averaged 235 lbs.

Miss Robinson, of London, has been engaged to fill the vacancy on the West Lorne public school staff caused by the resignation of Miss Ethel Brown.

While working at a joiner in the butter dish factory at Rodney, J. J. Misteal had the misfortune to have the tips of his fingers on his left hand taken off.

An examination of the eyesight of 38 M. C. R. engineers was made at St. Thomas by Assistant Superintendent Snow and Dr. Parker, oculist, and all were found satisfactory.

Alfred Nickerson, a well-known resident of Yarmouth, died Friday, aged 94 years. He was born in Malahide, and with the exception of a few years spent in Oregon resided in Elgin all his life. His wife predeceased him, and he leaves no family.

Arthur Francis, whose parents reside in Southwold, died at the Amasa Wood hospital with pneumonia. He was formerly a brakeman on the M. C. R., and returned home from Chicago two weeks ago on a visit, when he was suddenly stricken down.

The little daughter of Walter Williams, a farmer living near Calton, was poisoned at her home. She climbed up on a chair and took down a bottle of strychnine which stood on the clock shelf and swallowed a portion of the contents. She died in great agony shortly afterwards.

Robert Craig, of Copenhagen, died very suddenly, being apparently in the best of health, and while going about the house dropped dead. He was 59 years of age and was widely known throughout the district, having conducted sales of horses and cattle for a long time. Besides his wife, he is survived by three sons.

The death took place Thursday evening at West Lorne after a prolonged illness of Mrs. C. Frick, aged 84 years. Mrs. Frick had been a resident of the village for many years, being highly esteemed. She leaves to mourn her loss two sons: Jacob, at home; David, of Wisconsin; and one daughter, Mrs. D. Bowman, of Bad Axe, Mich.

Tag day in St. Thomas on Saturday in aid of the Y.M.C.A. was not the success that was anticipated. It was thought that \$5,000 would have been contributed. This amount was necessary to allow the association to clean up its indebtedness and permit some needed repairs and furnishings in the building. Only \$1,000 was realized.

She leaves a family of three sons: Wm., of Australia; James, of Woodstock, and John, of Aldborough, and two daughters, Mrs. Clark, Rodney, and Mrs. Nickerson, Tilbury. The funeral took place to the Rodney cemetery.

Toronto, April 27.—Market up 10c to 15c to-day above yesterday's market. The receipts were very light, contrary to the calculations of those buyers who banked on heavier receipts and easier prices. There are some very good quality cattle in just now, and this compels some of the smaller numbers, and consequently high prices now going. "I do not see how prices can go any higher than they are now," said a well known dealer this morning, "unless prices for butchers' meat go up higher, too." Opinions differ as to the near future of the market, some holding that there are plenty of cattle in the country, while others say they are very scarce. It is certain that drovers are paying very high prices in the country, and until the "grassers" begin to come in it does not look much like lower prices.

The run was 50 loads, with 750 head of cattle, 200 sheep and lambs, 400 hogs and 470 calves.
