Toronto, April 27—Market up 10c to 15c to-day above yesterday's market. The receipts were very light, contrary to the calculations of those buyers, who banked on heavier receipts and easier prices. There are some very good quality cattle in just now, and this compensates somewhat for the smaller numbers, and consequently high prices now going. "I do not see how prices can go any higher than they are now," said a well known dealer this morning, "unless prices for butchers' meat goes up higher, too." Opinions differ as to the near future of the market, some holding that there are plenty of cattle in the country, while others say they are very scarce. It is certain that drovers are paying very high prices in the country, and until the "grassers" begin to come in it does not look much like lower prices.

The run was 50 loads, with 736 head of cattle, 200 sheep and lambs, 400 hogs and 470 calyes.
