LONDON AND PRECINCTS.

Mr. Alex. McKellar, of the township of Westminster, died the other day, aged 77 years.

Rev. C. C. Conzans, of Thorndale, was cordially invited to remain on the circuit at the last quarterly official meeting.

Mr. Alexander Tait, of Silver Heights, Menitoba, is in the city looking for good horse flesh, which he proposes to take back with him.

The grocery stock of James Beattie, amounting to \$1,745.08 was sold by auction at St. Marys to J. W. Broderick, of this city, at 65¢ cents on the dollar.

The condition of Mr. William Dunn, of London South, who was severely injured by falling into an ash pit at the C. W. Works, a while ago, is very much improved.

On Friday morning Mr. C. Thorne, a milk dealer, living on the second corner of London township, was struck with paralysis. His condition is critical.

The veteran Bob Manly was charged at Magistrate Parke's court this morning with vagrancy. He was remanded for seven days. Two drunks were discharged.

Mr. John Burnett, veterinary surgeon to the Northwest Mounted Police, and Mrs. Burnett, who have been on a visit to relatives in this city for several weeks past, left yesterday afternoon per C. P. R. for Regina.

William Oldridge was charged by Daniel Shea at the Police Court this morning with stealing a game cock from his premises. The value of the bird was estimated by the owner to be \$25. The case was adjourned until to-morrow.

John Hall, the young man who was caught breaking into Neil Cooper's store on Dundas street one evening last week, came up for trial at the Police Court this morning. The Magistrate gave him three months in the Central Prison.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Societies' Demonstration it was decided to go on with the affair even without the co-operation of the Board of Trade, who some of the members thought—were too lukewarm in the matter.

The committee appointed to solicit subscriptions for the society demonstration, to be held in June, will start to-day canvassing. It is to be hoped that the merchants and people in general will be ready to support the movement with good donations.

Yesterday afternoon the funeral of the late Squire Sifton, of St. John's, took place from the English Church of that place, and was largely attended, the services being conducted by Venerable Archdeacon Marsh.

The pall-bearers were Messrs. James Grant, James Fitzgerald, Thomas Talbot, Fenton Fitzgerald and John Sniker.

Two charges appeared on the docket against Elijah Bavin at the Police Court this morning. One was the larceny of an axe from the C. P. R. company, on which he was discharged. The second charge was vagrancy, and as the testimony of the prisoner's wife made a very unfavorable impression of Bavin, he was sentenced to one month.

At last evening's meeting of the St. John's Parish Club, the following subject was discussed: "Resolved, that the State should grant a rudimentary education only." The question was ably debated by several members on each side of the question, and was finally decided by the negative, the advantages of liberal education and to the many being made strongly apparent. On Monday next essays by Messrs. H. P. Macklin on "Money" and Wilfred Davis on "The Idyls of the King" will form the programme of the evening.

Zera Semon in Trouble.
An interesting case came up before Mayor Watson, of Sarnia, on Saturday. Zera Semon, so well known to the public as the successful proprietor of a sort of variety show and lottery enterprise, who appeared

here a short time ago, was charged by Chief Windred with transgressing the Lottery Act. From the evidence it appears that each purchaser of tickets received an envelope for every ticket, many of which contained blanks, while some contained numbers entitling their purchasers to prizes. James Higgins gave evidence that he had purchased a number of tickets which were all blanks, and James Donahue testified that he had purchased one ticket and drew a gold watch. J. P. Bucke, crown attorney, conducted the prosecution, and C. M. Garvey appeared for the defense. Zera was fined \$20 and costs, amounting to \$47.

I'LL SETTLE IT.
Squire Jarvis to Try the Waterworks Case—Further Adjournment.

The adjourned case of Chapman vs. the Water Commissioners came up yesterday before Squire Jarvis in the interim session room. Squire Jarvis suggested that, as he had not been able to get the Attorney-General's opinion, some good legal opinion should be obtained, and his decision agreed to.

Mr. Meredith acquiesced, and Mr. Hutchinson objected, and then the Magistrate decided that he would go on with the case.

Mr. Hutchinson then desired to call the plaintiff.

Mr. K. M. Meredith objected and asked for a week's adjournment.

Mr. Hutchinson opposed any further adjournment of the case.

Mr. Meredith said it would be unfair to the defendants to go on, as he was only employed to question the jurisdiction, and he would like an opportunity of consulting his clients as to what action was now to be taken. When the case was adjourned two weeks ago this was understood.

After some further discussion Squire Jarvis said he would adjourn the case for a week.

Mr. Hutchinson said there was no necessity to delay. He had a witness here to examine and was ready to go on.

Squire Jarvis—But you said that you had about twenty witnesses.

Mr. Hutchinson—But I am only going to call one.

Mr. Meredith—The case is adjourned now.

Mr. Hutchinson—I don't see why a magistrate can't have a mind of his own and settle the case.

Mr. Meredith remarked that the Magistrate seemed to have expressed a mind of his own, but that Mr. Hutchinson wanted a different opinion.

After some further discussion the case was fixed for Monday next, at 2:30 p.m.
