Arrangements for a Rush to Klondike - Canadian Poultry in Good Demand.

London, Dec. 24.-Arrangements are being rapidly completed here in connection with the spring rush to the Klondike. The two Union Line steamers Athenian and Tartar have been secured for the Vancouver-Fort Wrangel service in connection with the Canadian Pacific. The ships will leave for Vancouver on Feb. 1, after an entire refitting. They are 4,000 tons each. have a speed of 14 knots, and will carry 200 first-class and 1,000 steerage passengers. Between 70 and 80 inquiries are made daily at the Canadian Pacific offices alone. where passengers are being booked through to Telegraph Creek.
