Militia Contracts Aired in the

House.

Supplies for the Camp at London and Kindred Questions Discussed.

Why Contracts for Clothing Were Not Allowed to Stand.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.-In the House yesterday, Hon. Mr. Laurier stated that it had been decided to lay before the House the letter of Gen. Gascoigne to Gen. Cameron, but as the former is an imperial officer, the consent of the Home Government must first be ob-

CAMP SUPPLIES. Mr. Reattie complained that the sun-

plies for the London camp had not been given out by tender. Mr. Gibson referred to the camp at Niagara as having been supplied for years on this principle, only Conser vatives getting contracts. Besides Mr. McCleary, member for Welland, had in times past got fat contracts without competition. He defied Major Beat-tie to name one Liberal who had a military contract in London.

Mr. Beattie retorted that Johnston Bros.-"bitter Grits," he called themsupplied bread to the permanent corps. Mr. McCleary asserted that his firm had never obtained a contract except in public competition Mr. Ingram and Sir Adolphe Caron defended militia management in the

past. The latter said the lowest tenderer always got the contract.

Mr. Mulock replied that in the matter of clothing contracts large sums were lost to the country by the work being given by the late Government to favorites by private offer. "Why," he went on, "what have I had to do every day? Why, my work day by day is canceling frauds committed by my predecessors in office."
At this Mr. Foster jumped up and

called the Postmaster-General to or-Sir Adolphe Caron indignantly demanded if the Postmaster-General charged him with fraud. The Speaker ruled that if Mr. Mu-

of what he contended, that in Cape Breton a mail contract for \$9,000 was continued while an offer to do the work for \$2,700 was before the Government. He declared the contracts had all gone to the lowest tender, "but," he said, "my hon. friends must not be disappointed if under the new regime the Liberals of Canada get a fair show. I'll make it my business to see that they do." (Loud Ministerial cheers.) He added that

broken. Col. Domville reminded Mr. Foster that the late Administration had purchased land for a drill hall as Sussex, N. The Minister of the Interior said that on looking into the clothing contracts he found one had awarded for three years, from July 1, 1896, and another com-mencing July 1, 1897, for two years. These contracts were let without tenders being asked for by public advertisement. He had referred the papers to the Department of Justice and received a carefuly prepared opinion from that department stating that the Militia Department had no authority whatever to make these contracts. He proposed, therefore, to annul the contract commencing July 1
