## JAMES AGNEW'S MURDER.

Resumption of the Inquest on the Lindsay Tragedy-Evidence Offered.

Lindsay, Ont., March 24.-A provincial detective arrived here last night to investigate the circumstances of the shooting of James Agnew on Tuesday night last. The inquest was continued last evening and adjourned till Wednesday, to permit of additional evidence being offered.

A good deal of time of the jury last night was taken up with arguments between counsel as to whether the Carney boys could be compelled to give evidence or not, and whether certain statements made by the boys after their arrest to the chief of police could be received as evidence. Patrick Carney, who is held as an accessory to the murder, was sworn, but refused to make any statement on the

advice of his counsel. Miss Ellen Marron, a maid at Logie's farm, where John Carney, who is accused of the murder, worked, identified at the inquest the trigger of a revolver which was found by the police at Logie's. John Car. ney's revolver had the trigger missing-Constables gave evidence as to the ing of the murdered man's watch at the Carney house. Plaster paris casts of the foot-prints of the supposed murderer were produced, and John Carney's overshoes, which he is said to have worn on the night Agnew was shot, were also exhibited.

Mrs. Carney, the mother of the boys. testified that her son Pat was home on the night of the murder shortly after 9:30, and did not go out again, and this evidence was corroborated by Alexander Petrie, who testified that he drove Pat in the direction of his home about that hour on Tuesday

Will be London's Synonym in the Near Future,

If the Citizens Continue to Build New Churches and Beautify Existing Ones-Astonishing Retrospective List-More to Come.

The last half-dozen years or so has made a wonderful difference in the church architecture of London. The new buildings and additions to old buildings have been remarkable, and even yet the movement for modern churches has not abated. Londoners have seen new churches going up almost every year, and have come to look upon the process as a matter of course. When the two large churches at present being built are finished, Lon- with a bigger load than he can comdon will have the most modern churches in Canada, and will probably have more comparatively new houses of worship than any other city of its size in America. Of course, the causes which necessitated the rebuilding of the two largest Methodist churches in the city were not the most desirable, but good has even come out of fire. The congregations have been moved to unprecedented exertion, and their zeal has been quickened under the additional burdens laid upon them. And now as they see the stately piles taking the places of the old buildings, they have come to regard the destruction of the former churches as a sort of blessing in disguise. The work in connection with the First Methodist Church will cost about \$60,000, and that of the Dundas Center about \$45,000—no inconsiderable amounts for any congregation

A little over a year ago the Anglicans spent \$55,000 or more in rebuilding St. Paul's Cathedral and erecting present accessible and imposing strucand the grounds tastily rearranged, so that the present buildings and grounds bear no resemblance whatever to those

of a few years ago. The winter just ending also saw the completion of a modest and comfortable Anglican church in East London, which takes the place of the wooden building which for many years had served as a place of worship for the St. Matthew's congregation. It was at one time the chapel and dead house at St. Paul's Cemetery, and will now be turned into a carpenter shop and dwell-

It is also not so very long ago-the foundation stone was laid on May 24, strictly first class company and there is 1894—since the beautiful building now not a weak spot in the cast. Tonight the occupied by the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church was built. Other city Presbyterian churches have also shown signs of activity in the building line—Knox Church, South London, last year completed a series of alterations and improvements almost equal to an entirely new building. Their building was enlarged and the ground built upon to the street front, with the most advantageous results. The same year saw the commencement of an extensive Sunday school adto St. James' Church, South London, and to Christ Church, Wellington street. Some time before, "All Saints' Mission," an adjunct of the building, and added its small quota to the advancement of London churches. In 1890 the new Colborne Street Methodist Church was completed during the pastorate of Rev. E. B. Lanceley, who is now pastor of the Dundas Center Church. The year before saw the completion of another church in the North End—that of St. John the Evangelist. Some alterations and additions were necessary there this year also, to accommodate the growing Sunday


