counties in this state. To the naked eye the twigs are incrusted in a fine white scale impervious to water, which may be removed only in the winter time by a strong solution of lye. The scale is the product of a minute in-sect which fastens itself upon the tree and penetrates the wood with its long feelers or borers.

The inspector to be appointed will have authority to prosecute persons who neglect to destroy the pests, to inspect nurseries and to destroy trees which are afflicted with the borers.
