THIS DAY IN HISTORY.

October 5.

678—Justin, Roman emperor at Constantinople, died.

1318—Edward Bruce, brother of King Robert of Scotland, was killed at Fagher, Ireland.

1703—Jonathan Edwards, famous Calvinistic divine, was born at Windsor, Conn.

1733—Lord Lloyd Kenyon, famous judge, was born in Cornwall, Flintshire.

1805—Charles, earl and later marquis Cornwallis, governor general of India, died at Ghazipur, born 1758, surrendered at Yorktown Oct. 19, 1781.

1813—General William H. Harrison defeated the British and Indians at the Thames, Ont.; Tecumseh was killed.

1838—Burning of the Crystal Palace in New York; loss \$1,135,000.

1888—Tom King, long the pugilistic champion of England, died.

1890—France and Dahomey concluded a peace.

1892—At Coffeyville, Kan., 4 citizens and 4 of the Dalton gang of robbers were killed in a fight.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—After the play is over.

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—The London Township Council has paid the funeral expenses of James David, who was accidentally killed in a brickyard on Adelaide street recently.

—Windsor Aldermen will visit London to inspect the fire department for pointers. They will find a daisy clock and ladder truck at the central hall.

—A voters' list court was to have been held yesterday at Delaware, but Judge Elliot telegraphed his inability to attend, and it did not materialize.

—The firemen had a run yesterday afternoon. A fire in a chimney near the corner of Talbot and Horton streets was the cause. No damage was done.

—James and Joseph Rankin, brothers of the late detective of that name, and James S. Rankin, his cousin, arrived in the city last night. They are stopping at the Grigg House.

—Mr. and Mrs. James Whiting, of London township, were the victims of a runaway accident on Talbot street north this morning. Whiting was thrown out at St. James' street, and her shoulder fractured. Mr. Whiting was dragged and bruised.

—The next few days at the Grand Opera House will be remarkable for a string of brilliant acts. On Saturday comes the great French actress Blanche on Tuesday, "The Crust of Society"; on Wednesday, the renowned Modjeska as "Mary Stuart"; and on Thursday, the Wizard Hermann.

—Mr. Thomas Hill, formerly of this city, who went to live in California about three years ago, has been visiting his friends in this vicinity. Besides taking a trip to England, Mr. Hill also paid a visit to the World's Fair, and returned to the States. While in London Mr. Hill attended the wedding of his brother Roland.

—The Epworth League of the Askin Street Methodist Church has elected officers for the year as follows: Mr. W. Copp, president; Miss Brenton, president Christian work department; Mr. Fred Wilson, president literary department; Miss Westman, president social department; Miss Cullen, president entertainment department; Mr. J. W. Cahill, secretary; Mr. H. P. Harding, treasurer. The league has 150 members.

—Of the "Crust of Society," which will be presented at the Grand Opera House Tuesday evening next, the Boston Globe once assembled at the Globe Theatre, there was present last evening to witness the first performance of "The Crust of Society." The play is one of half a dozen English adaptations of Dumas' "Demi-Monde."

It treats of a subject which will be interesting so long as a spark of human nature remains in this world; and it treats the subject according to the most advanced human nature as it is.

—Two men giving their names as Moore and Smith, who claimed to be molders by occupation, were walking along York street yesterday afternoon. Mr. Saunby's rig was standing in front of his store, and the two men thought they would take a drive, and accordingly got in and started down York street at a lively rate. A policeman happened to be near at the time, and seeing what had happened jumped into a rig and gave chase. The men were captured near the corner of Adelaide and York streets and were safely lodged in the cells.

Calverley's Condition.

A Trenton (N.J.) dispatch of Tuesday's date says: "There is a slight improvement in Calverley's condition to-day, although he has only partly regained consciousness. The doctors are not yet decided whether amputation of the right hand will be necessary."

The Queenly Rhea.

The production of Mlle. Rhea's new play, "The Queen of Sheba," last Saturday evening, Oct. 7, will be the most important event thus far of the present theatrical season at the London Opera House.

Indeed, there has not been up to the present time a New York production which compares in point of genuine historic interest to Mlle. Rhea's new play. The plot and dialogue of "The Queen of Sheba" are by Adrien Lafosse, a dramatist of excellent reputation in France, and a learned Oriental scholar besides. The translation is by J. L. Knabley, a Paris correspondent for the New York Herald and the London Times.

The music is by Oscar Comettant, the director of a school of music second to none in Paris, and also the musical editor of Le Siecle. The rehearsals have been conducted for Mlle. Rhea by Max Freeman (formerly of the Casino), whose personal supervision has been given to every detail of the production. There will no doubt be a large and fashionable audience here.

An Imitator of Calverley Ducked.

The small boys of London are very much in love with any thing of a strange character. Pawnee Bill and his wonderful cowboys have come and gone, leaving behind them the fascination for throwing the lasso, and as a result the small boy could be seen making vain attempts to entrap his schoolmate in the rope. The latest fad is that of high-wire walking, doubtless the

result of the unfortunate Clifford M. Calverley's recent visit. Yesterday afternoon a small boy named Victor Read, 7 years old, who resides with his parents on Bruce street, in company with several schoolmates, went to the Victoria bridge after school had been dismissed, and made an attempt to walk along the railing on the edge of the structure. In his foolish effort he lost his balance, and fell—not on the bridge, but into the river, a distance of probably 25 feet.

A young man employed by Mr. E. R. Richardson, South London, happened to be driving by at the time, and seeing the child fall ran down the bank and went in the water after him. He succeeded in reaching the boy and safely brought him to shore. The lad was taken to his home, when it was found he was more scared than hurt. It was a narrow escape.

HEADS THE LIST.

Manitoba's School Case Before the Supreme Court.

Discussion in Regard to Counsel—The Case Placed at the Top of the Ontario List.

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Justice Taschereau—I do not concur in the nomination, I am sorry to say. The statute says that when counsel does not appear the court has that discretion. When counsel appears I do not think the court has that discretion. The court has no right to make the nomination.

Mr. Wade proceeded to argue the interpretation put upon the statute, when the chief justices said that was a matter for the court and not for him.

Solitor-General Curren—While I appear to submit the reference, I do not intend to take part in the argument.

The case was then placed at the head of the Ontario list.
