"Sir,-My findings in note book on china painting in the London Art School is that No. 12,289, the number the blank report was written on, and No. 1,190, of page 56, received an award. This is the Cartwright exhibit of nine pieces. Again, 12,288, blank report, and No. 1,189, of same list, namely, the seven pieces exhibited by J. H. Griffiths, received an award."

The above is a paragraph from a letter received from E. P. Farr, the leading judge on the art exhibit in the Educational Liberal Arts Department of the Canadian section of the Columbian Exhibition, Chicago, 1893. The same letter states that in the notebook of the joint work of the judges, London Art School was entered for a collection award. The letter also mentions entry No. 12,286 and 12,281. Concerning No. 2,286, which was a crayon ornament from cast, by Mattie Griffiths, London Art School, it says this was checked for mention in the collection award, and No. 13,281, an oil color, by Mary Gray, was also checked for special mention, the merit being purity of primary colors, excellent technique and superior texture of drapery,
