PREMPEH PUT OUT. London, Dec. 10 .- A dispatch received here from Cape Coast Castle says is is reported there that the Ashantees have deposed King Prempeh, and that the war party have enthroned his mother as Queen in his stead.

THE SULTAN YIELDS. Paris, Dec. 10.-The Courier du Soir publishes a dispatch from Constantinople stating that the Sultan has signed firmans, with certain reserves, permitting the extra guardships to enter the Bosphorus.

DISASTER FOR THE ITALIANS. Rome, Dec. 10.—The Government has made the announcement in the Chamber of Deputies that the five companies of Italian soldiers composing the column under the command of Major Tosselli, operating in Abyssinia, had been surprised and surrounded by a force of 15,000 natives, and only a small portion of the command succeded in breaking through the beleaguering lines and making their retreat to Makalle. The fate of Major Tosselli and that part of his command remaining with him is yet unknown. Gen. Barrati, commanding the Italian forces in Abyssinia, is concentrating his troops at Makalle, and is prepared to repel the forces of the enemy which are moving in that direction.

Another dispatch says. The torce which went to the relief of Major Tosselli repulsed successive charges of bodies of Abyssinians, but could not reach of 1823." Major Tosselli. The latter's troops had exhausted their ammunition. As soon as the enemy learned this they charged upon the Italians, nearly all of whom were massacred. It is known that fourteen Italian officers and 700 men were killed, while 300 are missing, Gen. Baratieri is hastening to engage the enemy.

The Cabinet discussed the situation of the Italian troops and decided to send reinforce ments ammunition and artillery to them by the first transport. The public is much

excited over news of the defeat. London, Dec. 10.-The Daily News has a dispatch from Rome that virtually confirms the report that 14 Italian officers and 700 men were killed by the Abyssinians. The dispatch adds that the reinforcements that will be sent to the Italian troops will comprise six battalions, numbering 5,000 men. In the Senate today Senator Cullom made a lively address in support of his resolution introduced some days ago declaring in substance the Monroe doctrine to be by precedent and tradition the recognized rightful policy of the United States. In the Se judgment the time has come when the nation should put the question beyond cavil, and by more direct language than "that this Government cannot view with indifference attempts of Governments to colonize European either in North, South or Central America."

"The time has come," he said, "for a plain, positive declaration of the Monroe doctrine by Congress, and then, if necessary, plain, positive enforcement of it against all comers. The United States does not seek war with any nation, small or great. The days of war between civilized nations are passed, certainly in relation to ordinary matters of dispute. We do not attempt to interfere in matters touching interests or controversies in European countries, and we do not intend that European powers shall interfere in political affairs in this western continent. We do not claim that the world is ours, but we will insist on our right to be consulted upon affairs pertaining to the American continents. Let our declaration be so straight and practical that no American ambassador to the British court shall feel at liberty to question the policy of his own Government or possibly apologize for the declaration of independence and the Monroe doctrine

London, Dec. 9, 1895. I have sent a copy of the following letter to the Free Press for publication. I also make the same request to ALEX. LOGAN. To the Editor, Free Press:

I see by Saturday's issue of the Free

Press that Rev. R. L. Holden, the preacher-politician of Kent county fame, stated that he belonged to the 'saving element," and that he desired to lift up the colored people of this city. Now, sir, I think that before a man undertakes to lift up another, he should first get up himself. He also asserts that the Liberals of London have bought the colored people for dollars and cents. I, for one colored man in the city, declare that to be a libel. If it were the case, I would give the Liberals of the city more oredit than to assume that they would abuse the confidence placed in them by the colored people, and to advertise their buying of them. Unfortunately, per-haps, the colored people of London have not got the Liberals where his reverence has the Conservatives, for according to his own assertions, he does not have to ask, but demands at any time a "V" (\$5), or have a colored man placed upon the pay sheet of the Dominion Government, in proof of so he says, there are several already from Kent, with the promise, for the use of his influence, there will be more from London. It was all very well for a lawyer to speak of it, but one would think as a minister of the Gospel Mr. Holden should try and erase from his memory those days and nights in Kent, where kegs of beer and jugs of whisky were the influence strong enough for the stumpers. It appears those memories of the past still have a tenacious grip upon him. I do not think there are many colored people of the city who appeal to Mr. Holden to over-exert his energies to teach them what they are already above (a whisky keg). He is at liberty to use his own judgment as to how. to use a vulgar phrase, "to pull the leg" of the Conservatives for a few long greens (bills), but there are some who don't wish him to cast any insinuations upon them, for it won't go.
