LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mr. R. C. Macle, city, is in New York.

—Ex-Ald. Robt. Smith, of the first ward, has been very sick. He is now aged and very infirm.

—Miss Anna McCoy, of Alma College, St. Thomas, is visiting Mrs. W. R. McKay, Horton street.

—The half-yearly meeting of the Grand Trunk Railway Company is called for the 24th inst. in London, England.

—William H. Dailey, business manager of "The Leavenworth Case," is in the city. The play appears here shortly.

—Miss Ada Henderson and Miss Jennie McMillan, of this city, are visiting at Mrs. Geo. E. Wright's, 59 Manitoba street, St. Thomas.

—The many friends of Mrs. Childs, South London, a well-known worker in the W. C. T. U., will regret to hear that she is seriously ill.

—Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Waterman, and Mrs. Nettie Waterman, have returned home from a two months' sojourn in Bermuda. Mrs. Waterman has also returned from her visit to New York.

The estimates of No. 3 committee for 1893 aggregate \$22,733, as follows: Electric lighting, \$20,000; street watering, \$1,550; repairs to carts, \$200; market, \$223; market closets, \$500; sidewalks, \$300.

Miss Driffield's numerous London friends wish her the fullest measure of success.

The executive committee of the Northwest comrades of 1885 met last evening and made final arrangements for their first annual picnic to be held in the Tecumseh House on Friday evening, April 7. It was decided to meet at the City Hall at 8 o'clock for roll call, and headed by the Seventh Band the vets. will march to the hotel. The enthusiasm displayed denotes that there will be a large attendance.

—Mrs. George Hamilton, better known to Western people as Miss Anna D. Hunter, of the Huron Street office, is creating a decided sensation in musical circles in Leipzig by her singing. Several musical receptions have been given in her honor. At one, given by the Countess of Holsheim, Mrs. Hamilton gained great applause by singing a number of Brahms' most difficult songs at sight. Her voice has wonderfully improved since she went to Europe. Mrs. Hamilton is visiting her sister, Mrs. Hunter, who is studying at the Leipzig conservatory.

London Free Library.

A special meeting of the free library directors was held last night. Mr. Robert Reid was called to the chair, and the other members present were Messrs. Keene, E. R. Cameron, Dignan and Marks. The deputation appointed to confer with the City Council and No. 1 committee reported, and the directors named Saturday night next for a special meeting to meet the deputation from the City Council to consult as to ways and means, site of library, etc. The meeting will be held at 8 p.m. in the City Hall.

Muskats.

By an amendment of the law last session of the Local Legislature the open season for trapping muskrats was limited from Nov. 1 to April 1, instead of May 1, as previously. There has been much complaint about this alteration, and it is intended that the open season shall be changed back to May 1, and probably it was by inadvertence that the old season was altered. It is understood that circulars have been sent out from the chief wardens' office to the deputy wardens the present month of April of any trapping of muskrats which may take place; but this does not apply to shooting or using guns.

The Dailies Are Best.

John H. Woodbury, one of the largest and most successful advertisers in the United States, says: "I tackled about everything that came along (in the way of advertising), but I soon got my eye-teeth out, and confined myself to regular publications. We are gradually getting out of everything except dailies, for I think that no advertising mediums begin to approximate the daily newspapers."

—Mr. Gibson, of this city, according to the Bradford Examiner, ably assisted the young men of Wellington Street Methodist Church in that city on Monday night by singing "several solos, and also rendered several dialect recitations, which were heartily applauded."

The Tailors' Strike.

A committee of six of the striking tailors met a committee of the same number of the trade last night. The meeting was held in Mr. Hicks' tailor shop with closed doors, and some thick brown paper served as a screen on the windows to ward off a too inquisitive public. The conference commenced early in the evening and it lasted less than an hour about the matter than the men. "We are like the aldermen when they came back from Montreal," one of them said. "Mum's the word, you know."

From the men it was learned that a schedule of rates had been drawn up by the men present to be submitted to-day by the men to the union, and by the bosses to the rest of the bosses. The schedule as drawn up embodies all the concessions demanded by the men with very slight alterations, and if it meets with the approval of both sides to-day the men will go back to work.

"But if we don't," said a striker, "we will fight it out to the bitter end. We are getting \$6 a week while we are out, and we can tie up for a while without much inconvenience. There were no harsh feelings displayed at the meeting. Both men and bosses got down to business

with pencil and paper, and talked the matter over amicably. "Oh, we're getting there," said another of the tailors as he started for home. There were 52 tailors out when the strike commenced and the strikers claim that at least 50 of them are still out. So far no "scabs" have appeared from outside places, but there are several non-striking tailors belonging to the city who are working throughout the strike.

YE OLD FOLKES

Give a Greater Concert at Ye Play-House.

Old Fashioned Costumes—Good Old Songs and a Thoroughly Enjoyable Entertainment—Synopsis of the Performance.

Ye playhouse at ye corner o' King and Richmond streets, otherwise called the Grand, was crowded last night. It was a great audience and it was a "Greater Concert," as the homely looking programme printed on the roughest kind of brown paper, modestly intimated. "Ye billic o' fare," it went on to say, "is made up of a groat sorte o' quaintie musick dishes to meet ye wants o' ye hungry and thirly ones after goodly things."

Turning over a page readers were told that "Ye reception of ye old folkies will take place first, and will commence at eight o' clock, when Dame Dorothy Green and Father Hephall Birks will receive ye syngers, who will be presented by ye Chevalier Demetrius Sutherland." This announcement was made by Patriarch Adibition Carroll, and Scribblers Ipeacohanna Kennedy and Disregard Doggorell.

The rise of the curtain revealed a quaintly arranged apartment, in which spinning wheels, candles, an eight-day clock and other curios suggested ye olden times. Into the room walked the guests in couples. They were formally introduced to the audience, whom they saluted with graceful old-fashioned bows. The company comprised the following:

The costumes were decidedly rich. Those of the ladies were very unique, and included patterns of ancient, medieval, semi-modern and modern costume, with a disparity of color and style that was laughable as well as entertaining. One dated as far back as the period of the Elizabethan ruff, and others were effective satires on the decrees of fashion. A momentary shudder ran through the female portion of the audience at the appearance of the crinolines. Ye menne syngers wore knickerbockers and garments of showy material. Of course all had powdered wigs, and altogether looked thoroughly antique.

Parte first, opened with ye song of ye olden times, "Auld Lang Syne," the limit. Father Hephall Birks, yielding the baton.

The chorus proved to be well-drilled and evenly-balanced.

The song, "The Bugler," showed the resonant bass voice of Josephus Soper to advantage.

The three-part song, "Ye Shepherds Tell Me," by Joshua Taylor, Ichabod Collins and Meandering Belcher, was very prettily given by these talented vocalists.

"Home Again," by all ye singers, was notable for the fine technique and delicate shading which the timis, Father Birks, knows so well how to bring out. In ludicrous contrast was the lugue tune, "Russia," in ye Puritan style—one of the hardships which people had to undergo in the primitive days.

Dame Faithful Rosehannah Cooper's spinning wheel song was very nicely executed in kind, and the enthusiastic audience it received.

The rising young artist, Master Lafayette Angus, played a tune on ye fiddle, "Souvenir de Haydn," which exhibited his insight into classical selections.

Sprightly Mutch and Patriarch Carroll gave the very lively and amusing two-part song "Huntingtower" with a dramatic and vocal finish that quite captured the audience.

The charming spookpiece, "The Marble Dream," called into play the elocutionary powers of Dame Cheerful Sage-Mills, who gave it an intelligent rendering. The lighter selection, "Raggedy Man," further on, was also satisfactory.

A song, "Cousin Jedediah," by Consolation Biddy and the chorus, was quaintly humorous. The words ran something like this:

Now, Obed, wash y'r face, boy, and tallow up y'r shoes.

While I go to see Aunt Betty and tell her all ye news.

And Kiddy grease y'r hair, and put on y'r Sunday gown.

For Cousin Jedediah comes right from Boston town.

A worldie ditty, "Canzonetta," was sung by Nancy Livespark Ziegler in her splendid soprano voice. The ever-fragrant "Last Rose of Summer" concluded the first part.

The familiar strains of "Home, Sweet Home" sounded sweet indeed in chorus. It was followed by the solo, "The Ballad of Daughter of Irlington," given with pleasing piquancy by Holdfast Daly. The four menne syngers, Patriarch Carroll, Ichabod Collins, Josephus Soper and Meandering Belcher, warbled the tune down to Scottish hearts, "The Blue Bells of Scotland," "The Anchor's Weighed" and "The Two Grenadiers," by Mr. Carroll and Mr. Belcher respectively, were most pleasing contributions to the programme.

Angus' second fiddle piece received a rapturous encore, which he acknowledged with a bow. Mrs. Cooper's second number was excellent. The good old Scotch ballad, "Ye Banks and Braes," lost none of its charms in the hands, or rather the mouths, of Livespark Ziegler and Consolation Biddy. Last came "Rule Britannia," Patriarch Carroll taking the solo part. Flags were waved as "God Save the Queen" announced the end.

Ye Old Folkies' Concert was a splendid success—artistically and no doubt financially. The principals included some of the best musical talent in the city, and the performance had the flavor of refreshing originality, which is very often missing in such affairs.
