Plain Talk to Britishers.

Mr. Barber, the president of the Diamond Match Company, talked with wholesome frankness to the dissenting stockholders of that English match company, the control of which has just been secured by his company. He said to these Englishmen, who had spoken of "Yankee trickery" and who had boasted of their intention to fight to the death to retain for English capital the business of making matches for British use, that: "I may as well talk frankly to you people. Unless you come to terms we will whip you out of your boots. We know that we are able to beat the world in the manufacture of matches, and we intend to keep our advantage. How long do you think you can compete with us with machinery that America discarded sixteen years ago?" This is not "Yankee bragging." It gives the reason why Englishmen have been unable to compete successfully with Americans in making matches. It is the reason assigned often by English experts for the superiority of the American manufacturer in certain industries. He has a scrap heap and throws his machines on it when better machines have been invented. The English manufacturer has no scrap heap. The Diamond Match Company people, having obtained control of an English plant, are "making a scrap pile" of the "American factories discarded in 1885." These machines cost originally \$1,500,000.
Mr. Barber says he heard murmurs of "astonishment from Englishmen whom he told that his company had spent a million dollars on "new ideas in machinery," and exclamations of horror when he said to them that its Liverpool manager got \$10,000 a year. The American idea is to get the best machinery and the best men, no matter what the cost may be, because expenditures in these directions are profitable. The English idea is to use machinery until it is worn out. The Englishman believes that the machinery which was made for his father is good enough for him. The American is ready to throw out the machines he bought a year before when something better is offered him. Conservatism is admirable in its

SALMON COMBINE

Thirty Canneries in Alaska and on Puget Sound Interested.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 12.—The work of combining 30 salmon canneries on Puget Sound and in Alaska, was completed Saturday, and the Pacific Packing and Navigation Company paid about \$5,000,000 in cash and distributed stock to the various cannery men who have come into the combination. The firms who constitute the new company are Pacific-American Fish-Company, Pacific Steam Whaling Company, Alingworth & Dunn, Fair Haven Canning Company, Quadra Packing Company, Icy Straits Packing Company, Taku Packing Company, Chilcot Packing Company, Boston Fishing and Packing Company.

COAL IN ESSEX

Windsor Capitalists Excited Over an Important Discovery Made Near Walkerville.

Windsor, Ont., Aug. 12.—Windsor capitalists are excited over the discovery of soft coal about Walkerville. Experts of the Saginaw, Mich., coal mining company have just completed an exploration of the land in the rear of Wolfe's reserve, and they say they found unmistakable traces of that fuel. The coal is said to be discernible on the surface, and is thought to extend many feet into the earth. The land until a few years ago was submerged by Lake St. Clair. Hundreds of acres are said to contain the coal. Mayor Rothwell, of Windsor, is promoting a company to erect a sugar beet factory at Sandwich. It is said two capitalists have agreed to invest \$50,000 in the enterprise. The factory will have a capacity of 600 tons a day, involving the expenditure of \$350,000 annually for beets, requiring between 6,000 and 7,000 acres to grow them.
