The Old Board of Officers Re-Elected -Interesting Address of Mr.

The annual convention of the Middlesex County Women's Christian Temperance Union was concluded last evening. It was in many respects the most successful held in recent years. The final meeting last evening was held in St. Andrew's Church, Mrs. May R. Thornley presiding. The opening services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Johnston and Rev. E. Holmes The principal addresses were delivered by Mr. J. S. Leckie, missionary to lum-bermen, and Mr. Beal, of Peterboro, who spoke on "Purity."

Mr. Leckie gave an address of thrilling interest, describing the conditions in the lumber camp and the methods his work in reaching men. Since his first entry into the camps he has established a circuit embracing 600 camps and 14,000 men. Many of the men are from 35 to 50 years of age, and have spent most of their lives under the uncultured influence of the lumber camps without a thought as to their spiritual welfare. Churches are not accessible, and even if they were the average lumberman would scarcely attend, the only way to reach him being to go into his little shack on Saturday or in the evenings when he is resting from the hard work in which he is engaged. The men are all well fed and well cared for, although the drink eyil has found its way into the most remote of the camps.


