

STEEL TRUST MILLIONAIRES ARRAIGNED BY U. S. RECEIVER

Stock Manipulations of Morgan, Schwab and Gates Referred To As Fraudulent.

RECEIVED BONDS FOR WHICH NOTHING WAS PAID

New York, Oct. 28.—The American says today: J. Pierpont Morgan, Charles M. Schwab, Col. J. J. McCook and other are arraigned severely by Receiver James Smith, jun., in his report on the United States Shipbuilding Company's affairs, which was completed last night for filing with United States Circuit Judge Kirkpatrick in Trenton.

Receiver Smith states that Charles M. Schwab, J. Pierpont Morgan, Herbert Satterlee, Morgan's son-in-law, and several vendors or controlling owners of constituent companies received bonds and stock for which no equivalent was ever paid the United States Shipbuilding Company. His report charges that Schwab and Morgan alone received \$20,000,000 preferred and common stock, for which they rendered absolutely no equivalent. He strongly recommends that all such holdings be assessed at a fair estimate on their face or market value.

He also characterizes as reprehensible the secret Morgan-Schwab-Harris-Gates & Co. agreement, by which the \$20,000,000 of Morgan and Schwab preferred and common shipbuilding stock was to be marketed in advance of other outside securities.

Ugly terms, such as "fraudulent" and "reprehensible" abound in the voluminous report, which is remarkable also for its drastic handling of various questionable phases of United States shipbuilding promotion, and particularly the sale, or loan, of the Bethlehem Steel Company by Charles M. Schwab. Receiver Smith goes so far as to intimate strongly that Charles M. Schwab was acting simply as an agent for the Morgan dollar stock trust, when he paid \$2,000,000 for the Bethlehem plant.

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PRESIDENT DIAZ OF MEXICO ATTACKED BY AN ASSASSIN

Five Shots Were Discharged Point Blank at Mexican Executive, But None Took Effect.

HIS ASSAILANT WAS ARRESTED AND IMPRISONED

Guanajuato, Mex., Oct. 28.—Great excitement was caused here yesterday by an attempt on the life of President Diaz, who was a guest of the state government during the festivities here. The president, his staff and guests were passing by the Cantagorda Garden in a street car when a man of the lower class named Ellis Toscano approached the car, shouting, and fired five shots from a revolver at the car. None of the shots took effect.

Pablo Escandon, of the president's staff, rushed out of the car and caught the man, wrenching the revolver from his grasp. The police took Toscano to prison. He is a man with a bad criminal record and was but recently released from prison at Guanajuato, where he had served a term for homicide. The matter will be investigated. The president remained perfectly cool and was acclaimed by the crowd of citizens who showed their joy at his escape.

Toscano's evil record renders the theory of a deliberate attempt at assassination probable. The president received the congratulations of the city and diplomatic corps.

An attempt was made on the life of President Diaz on the 16th of December, 1887. He attended on that day the public celebration in the City of Mexico of the anniversary of Mexican independence. During the festivities a man rushed toward him, and, evading all efforts made to check his progress, reached the president's side and attempted to kill him. Great excitement prevailed, but it was soon seen that the efforts of the murderer had been futile. President Diaz was not hurt. The assassin was at once arrested and thrown into prison. This attempted murder created much excitement and subsequently the assassin was dragged from prison by a mob and lynched.

Guanajuato is about 160 miles northwest of Mexico City. It is singularly situated in deep, narrow mountain defiles, over six thousand feet above sea level. It is formed of a number of villages located around the mines and has a population numbering 63,000.

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PRINCE GALITZIN STABBED 3 TIMES

Russian Gov.-Gen. of Transcaucasia Attacked.

IN THE OUTSKIRTS OF TIFLIS

The Cossack Guard Runs Down and Shoots Three of the Band to Death.

Tiflis, Russian Transcaucasia, Oct. 28.—Prince Galitzin, Governor-General of the Caucasus, had a narrow escape from assassination yesterday on the outskirts of the town. Three natives stabbed the Governor-General three times. They fled, but were subsequently shot down by Cossacks. Prince Galitzin was driving with his wife when the would-be assassins rushed upon the carriage, daggers in hand. Two seized the Governor-General and attempted to drag him from the vehicle, while the third man inflicted two ugly wounds on the prince's head and a third cut on the hand. A Cossack who was in attendance upon his excellency threw himself upon the assassins. While a hand-to-hand fight was in progress, the carriage was driven off at a gallop. Ultimately the assassins fled, followed by a mounted guard of Cossacks, who had hurried to the scene.

The Cossacks chased the fugitives through the brush, firing constantly with their rifles. They killed one man instantly. The other two were shot down and their injuries had been dressed. Prince Galitzin attended a reception given by the citizens of Tiflis.

The attack has produced great indignation, the Governor-General having become popular on account of his interest in the welfare of the inhabitants. Owing to the excitement, performances at the theaters were suspended. 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OLD AND SAPPHIRES Rich Discoveries Made in New South Wales.

Sydney, Oct. 28.—Rich gold discoveries have been made in New South Wales, at Hill End and near Timut.

THE U. S. REVENUE FLEET TO STAY

Clashes of the Canadian Boats and American Fishermen Partly Responsible.

Washington, Oct. 28.—It is stated at the treasury department that the fleet of revenue cutters for the great lakes will be permanently retained there. The explanation is made that the growing business of those waterways and the recent clashes between the Canadian patrols and American fishermen, coupled with a possibility of a recurrence of such troubles, necessitates the presence there of an adequate revenue force. Therefore, while there may be changes in the assignment of vessels, the number will not be reduced at any time.

Not for many years has there been such a show of such force on the great lakes as at present. The lakes are about to be divided into districts. The Tuscara, stationed at Milwaukee, will be assigned to Lakes Superior and Michigan. The Morrill, which succeeds the Fessenden at Detroit, will cover Lakes Huron and Erie. The Dallas, now on Lake Ontario, will be retained there.

President Diaz of Mexico, Who Has Just Had Narrow Escape From Assassination.

COUNTRESS IS PUT ON TRIAL

A Polish Aristocrat Is Accused of Plotting for Fraudulent Heir.

Berlin, Oct. 28.—The trial of Countess Isabella Wehrska Kwellicki, belonging to a rich and aristocratic Polish family, on the charge of pretending to have borne a son over six years ago, and presenting him as the heir to an estate in Wroclaw, province of Posen, consisting of 10,000 acres, and having a yearly rental roll of \$15,000, began here Monday.

Count Kwellicki appears at the trial, charged with being an accessory to the crime. A midwife and two women servants also were placed in the box as accessories.

The marriage of the Countess with Count Kwellicki, a peasant of Posen, brought 250 witnesses, mostly Polish peasants, who lent picturesqueness to the scene, with the variegated colors of their costumes and head gear, and crying babies.

The alleged son is said to have been born on Jan. 27, 1897. The prosecution claims that he is the son of a peasant of Parze, in Austrian Silesia, who is present as a witness and as a claimant for the child.

The countess, who is of aristocratic appearance, pleaded not guilty, and sweepingly denied complicity in any criminal act, but was unable to give satisfactory explanations of many suspicious circumstances, and some damaging facts were brought out.

NO CLUE TO MURDERER Sagouni's Slayer.

London, Oct. 28.—The search of the police for the murderer of Sagouni, president of the Armenian Revolutionary Society in London, who was shot and killed by an unknown assassin in the suburb of Nunhead late on Monday evening, has been futile up to noon today.

Several foreign revolutionary clubs were raided during the early hours of the morning, but with no result.

The inquest opened this morning, and an important point developed was that the murderer shot with his left hand. The revolver was an ordinary five-chamber weapon, and not an automatic ten-shot arm, as reported.

TARTE AND LE CANADA

Ex-Minister Says He Received No Money From Mr. Hugh Graham.

He had not received any money, directly or indirectly, from Mr. Graham, nor had any of the directors of La Patrie, the newspaper of which the ex-minister of public works is editor. Mr. Graham corroborated this evidence, saying that all the money he had paid out in the article was \$300 to Mr. L. P. Pelletier, organizer for the Conservative party in this province. Mr. Graham added that he could produce books to show that position he had made of electoral funds, and he is expected to do so when the case is recalled.

ALLEGHENY QUARANTINED

Radical Measures Taken to Stamp Out Smallpox.

Pittsburg, Oct. 28.—Allegheny will be quarantined today to protect the outside public from smallpox contagion if the state board of health carries out its threat. For several months Allegheny has been afflicted with many cases of smallpox, but the authorities of the city were confident of being able to control the disease without resorting to heroic measures. Dr. W. R. Bott, quarantine officer at large of the state board of health, investigated the situation, and on Oct. 19 notified Superintendent McLaughlin, of the Allegheny Health Bureau, that the state board had decided to quarantine the city unless within five days the laws regulating the control of contagious diseases were enforced by the Allegheny Board of Health.

The time limit expired on Saturday, but because of the appeals of prominent citizens it was extended. Allegheny closed its public meeting on Monday failed to take the steps deemed necessary by the state board, hence the radical action by that body.

Dr. Bott arrives here today when it is expected he will put in force the quarantine law in its fullest sense and the people of Allegheny will be prevented from leaving the city. Already orders have been issued to regulate the transmission of mail, money by banks, parcels, packages and baggage by express and otherwise.

OBJECTS TO RECEPTION

HUNDREDS ARE MADE HOMELESS BY FIRE IN KINGSBRIDGE, N. Y.

One Fireman Dead, Scores Injured and Twenty Buildings Consumed.

New York, Oct. 28.—Hundreds are homeless today, one fireman is dead, and a score or more are suffering from injuries as the result of a fire that wiped out a large section of Kingsbridge, last night.

Twenty buildings, including stores and dwellings, which sheltered thirty families, were totally destroyed, and 150 men, women and children, half-clad, were turned homeless out into the cold morning air. John J. Sullivan, 26 years of age, a fireman, of engine company No. 62, was relieved at 6 o'clock this morning after fighting the flames all night. He was in an exhausted condition, and while waiting for a car to go home he died.

The damage will probably exceed \$150,000, most of the loss falling on the Dyckman estate, which owned the greater part of the property destroyed.

The buildings destroyed were on both sides of Riverdale avenue, in the blocks bounded by Church and Ackerman streets. The fire started in the feed and coal store of T. & W. Thorn, at Riverdale avenue, near Ackerman street. TROUBLE WITH TRUSTS

Several St. Louis Institutions Close Their Doors.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 28.—Long before 10 o'clock, the hour of opening, lines of depositors stretched away from the closed doors of the Mississippi Valley Trust Company, the Lincoln Trust Company, the Mercantile Trust Company and the Missouri Trust Company. Small crowds were assembled before the doors of some of the other savings institutions also. Most of those in the line were working people, and many of them women. Owing to the action taken last night by the officials of the trust companies in St. Louis, requiring 30 and 60 day notices of intention to withdraw funds, depositors were not able to get any money. All they could do was to declare their intention of withdrawing their deposits at the expiration of the time limit. The trust companies also have decided not to pay certificates of deposit before maturity.

English Coal for Russia.

Berlin, Oct. 28.—According to the Hamburg Nachrichten, the steamer Baltavia, the largest freighter of the Hamburg-American Line, will go to England, where she will load 10,000 tons of coal and proceed for East Asia. The coal is for the use of the Russian Government.

SULTAN IS GREATLY ANGERED BY THE POWERS' REFORM SCHEME

But Is Helpless to Resist—Reign of Barbarism Drawing to a Close.

Constantinople, Oct. 28.—Nobody in the diplomatic corps here doubts that the time has arrived when the cardinal features of Turkish rule in Macedonia must begin to disappear. The new reform scheme of the powers with the improved mechanism for its reinforcement make that result practically certain. The powers are committed to this and cannot consistently with their own dignity and interests turn back, though going forward and finally necessitate the dreaded expedient of the employment of force.

Abdul Hamid is said fully to realize the gravity of the situation from the standpoint of Turkish sovereignty. He intensely resents the new scheme, but unless he can break the solidarity of the powers he is helpless. The Sultan could easily precipitate a tremendous struggle, but it is doubtful if even the hotheads among his advisers would counsel such a course in the absence of some sign of encouragement from one or another quarter of Europe. It is not believed any such sign will appear.
