He says the alleged dum dum bullets found at Liao Yang are simply the regular square-nosed bullets of the service revolver. They are of the same caliber as the Russian rifle of 1891, and the bullets are all lead, are not jacketed, and are in no wise dum dums. The general also denies the statement that the Japanese captured a large quantity of ammunition. He says they obtained possession only of a few boxes of empty cartridge shells, and says it is not true that the Russian roiling stock fell into the hands of the Japanese. Only two old trucks, he ados, were left on a siding.

Paris, Sept. 17.-Exact figures of the Russian losses in killed, wounded and missing in the operations before Liao Yang, from Aug. 13 to Aug. 26, have been received by the general staff, according to the Journal's St. Petersburg correspondent. These amount to two generals, 256 officers and 21,800 soldiers. In addition 133 guns were lost. The material losses include fortifications costing \$30,000,000.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 17, 2:25 a.m. -The war office has heard the report of an apparent Japanese concentration against the flanks of General Kuropatkin's army, preparatory to an advance toward Mukden. While it is not in a position to absolutely confirm or deny the report, it would surprise the war office should Field Marshal Oyama have been able in so short a time to organize his forces for a serious advance northwards.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 17.-A dispatch from Mukden says the Russian patrols, up to the present time have repulsed all Japanese outpost attacks, and that communications with Sinmintin have not been interrupted. Practically all the Russian stragglers, according to this dispatch, have arrived at Mukden. General Samsonoff has been promoted to the rank of general of division.
