



## ON LEAVING LUCAN

**Presentation to Rev. J. A. Aycarrst by Masonic Brethren**

—To the Rev. John A. Aycarrst, B. A.:

## WANT ASPHALT PAVEMENT, WIDE OPEN SPECIFICATIONS

King Street Ratepayers Submit a Petition to the City Council.

Warm Exchange Between Aldermen—Another Lawsuit—Ald. Saunders' Suggestion.

Last night's meeting of the city council proved to be highly important and greatly interesting from all points of view, and it was getting on toward 11 o'clock when an adjournment was made. The adjournment stands until Aug. 21, unless the mayor sees fit to call a special session for some important business. Mayor Campbell being in Toronto, Ald. Stevely was acting for him, and he presided over the meeting. The meeting was very well attended, and the business before the council was of a most important nature.

The business before the council included a proposal to send two delegates to the convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities, which is to be held in Winnipeg this month, and it was defeated; the application of the Dymont-Baker Lumber Company to a switch across the Michigan Central tracks to the company's yards, which occasioned a great deal of talk, but was finally granted; the receipt of a notice of action for damages from Maurice Baldwin, which was simply sent to the board of works, and the receipt of a petition for a street asphalt pavement on King street, between Wellington and Maitland streets. A large grist of smaller matters also came up during the evening.

**May Construct Siding.**  
The Dymont-Baker Company asked permission to construct a siding at its recently acquired mill on Bathurst street (formerly the London Machine and Tool Company), and the city council was asked to grant the permission.

Ald. Cooper moved, seconded by Ald. Matthews, that the city council should grant the permission, and that the city should acquire the land for the siding to be built.

Ald. Cooper was present and addressed the council in support of the application. He explained that all he wants to do is to run a spur across the street from the machine tool company tracks into the Machine Tool Company yard.

Some By-Play.  
Quite a little by-play was occasioned when the communication was read re the appointing of delegates to represent the city of London at Winnipeg on July 25 at the annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities.

Ald. Gillean moved, seconded by Ald. Greenlees, that Ald. Stevely and Ald. Forristal be named as the delegates.

Ald. Cooper moved, seconded by Ald. Matthews, that the communication be filed.

In explanation, after Ald. Greenlees had declared it was a good thing to send representatives to take part in the deliberations of the union, Ald. Cooper stated that the Union of Canadian Municipalities is merely a fad.

Ald. Greenlees hadn't imbibed any great good from his trip to Toronto in 1903, when the convention was held there. If he had, he hadn't given any of it to council. Neither had ex-Mayor Beck, nor ex-City Clerk Edwards. This business was just the same as the Niagara power business, for which the city is paying out thousands of dollars, and which will never amount to a "hill of beans." All the convention held in London last year amounted to was simply a trip to Springfield, where the delegates had their pictures taken.

Ald. Matthews also spoke against the motion. There had been too many deputations this year.

Continuing, Ald. Matthews said he hadn't seen Ald. Greenlees in attendance at the convention held in London last year.

"You were blind, then," said Ald. Greenlees.

A vote was then taken, on the motion to send the two delegates to Winnipeg, and it was defeated on a negative vote. The yeas and nays were then called for, and it was defeated by 7 to 4, as follows:

Yeas—Ald. Greenlees, Gillean, Garratt and Forristal—4.

Nays—Ald. Cooper, Carson, Abram, Matthews, Saunders, Gerry and Wyatt—7.

**His Perennial Motion.**  
Ald. Carson gave notice of motion that at the next meeting of the council he will move that the city council obtain from the London Street Railway Company full particulars regarding their past business, and ascertain the lowest purchase price of the road, and also the council after thorough investigation, consider it a good investment, and to the general interest of the citizens to have the street railway owned and operated by the city, the full particulars be advertised, and the proposal be put to a vote at the next municipal election."

The recommendation of No. 1 committee that the application of the Dymont-Baker Company to have the taxes on its premises, owing to the fire, remitted for seven months of this year, be filed, was adopted.

The request of E. Leonard & Sons for a fixed assessment this year was referred back to No. 1 committee for further information.

A clause of No. 1 committee's report, recommending that the London Street Railway Company should be compelled to stop its cars in the center of the blocks be adopted was struck out, as the city has no jurisdiction in the matter. The company may either stop its cars in the center of the blocks or not as it sees fit.

The notice of Cronyn & Betts, in the action for damages of Maurice Baldwin, was referred to No. 1 committee.

The arrangement were granted the free use of Queen's Park for their demonstration on the 12th July.

Fraser & Moore wrote that as, by an act of the legislature, the Y. W. C. A. property is exempt from taxation, except for local improvements, the notice moved on the Y. W. C. A. for the full amount of taxes will not be amended. Referred to No. 1 committee.
