THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO TODAY

[From The London Advertiser of Jan.
17, 1871.]

The council resumed their sitting at 7:30
p.m. last evening, his Worship Mayor

lar vote.

free.

Ald. Partridge, sen., gave notice that at

London), which is being wound up by

SUGAR TAKES A DROP

Slight Reduction Made by Grocers'
Guild Owing to Large Crop.

The prices for all sugars in Ontario
have been reduced 10 cents a hundred
by the Grocers' Guild. The reduction
is made in consequence of a large beet
sugar crop in Europe. It is said that
the reduction will not make any dif-
ference to the average housekeeper, as
the 10 cents a hundred is too small to
make an appreciable difference on the
price of small lots.

YEAR OF GOOD PROGRESS

Encouraging Reports by Officers of
Adelaide Street Church.

Very interesting and encouraging re-
ports were presented at the yearly
business meeting of the Adelaide
Street Baptist Church, which was held
last evening, and which, in spite of the
prevailing storm, was fairly well at-
tended. After a short prayer service,
the treasurer's report was read, which
showed that contributions to the vari-
ous departments of church work
amounted to very nearly \$5,000, being
about \$2,000 more than was raised the
previous year. Included in the dis-
bursements for the past year is \$1,200,
in payment of a long-standing mort-
gage.

The Ladies' Aid have undertaken to
provide carpet and platform furnish-
ings for the new church auditorium,
and feel much encouraged by the suc-
cess that has attended their efforts so
far in securing needed funds.

Subscriptions toward the purchase of
a new pipe-organ, costing \$2,000, have
been received to such an extent as to
warrant the finance committee in or-
dering the instrument, which is to be
built expressly for the church, and will
likely be installed during April.

In spite of the extra expense and
loss attendant on being away from
their own meeting place, the church's
contributions to home and foreign mis-
sions have been liberal, if not fully up
to the average of late years. The Sun-
day school, too, is making encouraging
progress.

During the year, the number of
members increased from 267 to 332;
there were 2 deaths, and 8 were
transferred by letter to other churches,
leaving 55 as the net increase for the
year.

The pastor, in his brief report, ex-
pressed great satisfaction at the con-
fidence and esteem shown him by the
members in general, and the earnest,
efficient support given him by all the
officers of the church. While grateful
for the success of the past, he felt con-
fident of a far better record for them
during the new year. In the work of
