MAPLE LEAF'S FINE SCORE

Complete Scores of Yesterday in the
Big Bowling Tournament at
Hamilton.

Hamilton, March 29.—The Maple Leaf of Guelph were the only team in the novice event to make a particularly good score at the C. A. A. U. today. The Royal City team bowled in fine form, especially when they were up well with 578. Their aggregate score of 2,388 put them at the head of the novice class, displacing the Elton Parkdale. Later, however, the Hamilton Gun Club went them one better in this class, rolling 2,456, which puts them in line for the prize money.

The open event, the Pajamas, of Syracuse who rated quite a sensation by appearing garbed in gaily-colored pajamas, rolled a fine game, making a total of 2,601 pins. This puts the National No. 3 team out of the running for third place in the open event, the latter having a score of 2,579. The scores in the different events were as follows:

ONLY KICKERS DEVELOPED
BY THE PRESENT RULESA New Decision by the American
Football Association.

New York, March 29.—An important change in the football rules was made by the intercollegiate football rules committee, which completed its session at the Murray Hill Hotel today, in the reduction of points for a goal from four to two. The object of this change, it was said, was to prevent two goals from the field counting more than a player on the ground. Members of the committee said it stopped the development of teams of star field goal kickers, and made it harder for a mediocre team with a good kicker to beat out a better all-around team without a star kicker.

Another change of importance was one designed to prevent confusion in conflicting penalties, when two penalties had been incurred by one team for the same play, by giving the offended team the option of saying which penalty should be imposed. A change was made in the rules relating to a touchback, so as to relieve some of the hardships of the team down under its own goal, especially when it has been forced there otherwise than by rushing. The new rule gives the team making the touchback rushes before the kick, while the old rule only provided the option of kicking out or keeping the ball for a scrimmage on the line. A rule was adopted providing that when a centre fumbles or makes a fake attempt to pass the ball his team shall be penalized five yards.

No change of moment in the rules relating to the forward pass was made.

The New York Sun, Ketchel proved by this remarkable exhibition of bulldog courage and pugnacity that he is one of the greatest fighters the world has ever seen. He never lost heart in the face of the greuling punishment he received, but kept on forcing the fight until he had over the punches he had been trying from the outset to land. It was the worst beating that O'Brien ever received, and Ketchel was a real hero when O'Brien lay in triumph to his dressing-room.

It was a corking fight and every one went away with the impression that Ketchel one of these days will be the champion heavyweight of the world. No Chance!

New York American: And Ketchel? A fighter, pure and simple. He has nothing with which to deceive either his opponent or the public. He is the type seldom found in a champion—a knockout fighter, without the first idea of cleverness, one who Philadelphia John was dazzling western society, he used to say that there was nothing so complex as the intensely simple. Last night the Philadelphia found that there was some truth in the famous epigram.

O'Brien was whipped into unconsciousness by a boy who does not know the first principles of scientific boxing, and when the final bell sounded the old campaigner and winner of a hundred battles was flat on his back in his own corner, with his battered head resting in his resin box.

The finishing touch was a whizzing right hander, which landed flush on the point of the chin. O'Brien toppled backward, stiffening as he fell, and when his head struck the floor it bounced several inches and then settled back into the resin dust. Several hundred people who have been waiting for just this thing to happen for more years than they can remember stood up to howl their approval, and just as the cheering reached its climax the bang of the bell cut through the steady roar and O'Brien was saved from a technical knockout.

Arrives at New York for Final Week
of His Training.

New York, March 29.—Longboat arrived here yesterday. He was looking in almost perfect condition, and by Saturday he will have a chance to get acclimated. The Derby takes place at the Polo grounds.

Longboat is accompanied by Tim O'Rourke and Bill Davis, the first man to train the Indian. They are both confident that he will be the winner in Saturday's great event. Longboat is staying at one of the Jerome Avenue road houses, and the strictest care is being taken to see that he is in the best possible condition.

The race will be one of the greatest in the history of the Derby. It is the Indian's chance to prove himself. Many think that Shrubub will outlast Longboat, but the majority still favor the Indian. If the track is heavy, as is not improbable, it will tell in the latter's favor heavily, as Shrubub is up best on a hard, smooth track.

HIS LAST, SAYS SHRUBUB.

Ottawa, March 29.—If Flanagan gets on the track at the Polo grounds at New York next Friday night, and by Saturday the unfair tactics he worked on me in my race with Longboat, I'll pitch him out of the ground. If you'll stop the race, if the officials permit that man Flanagan to get on the track and pace his man.
