3.—That while accepting the evolution of the body, a direct creation of God was required to give man his reason and will and soul.

A feature of the evening was a very lucid address given by Principal Valler, on the annular theory of creation, as set forth by Mr. Isaac N. Vall. This address was the feature of the evening, and at the conclusion of the debate a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Principal Valler.

TO VIEW COBALT MINES

Scheme to Bring Party of European Journalists to Canada.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Oct. 4.—A scheme is on foot to bring a party of European journalists to Canada to view the Cobalt mines next spring.

The proposition was laid before Premier Whitney and Hon. Frank Cockburn this morning by a deputation consisting of J. E. Leonard, M. P.; Laval; A. Claude Macdonnell, M. P.; Toronto; Rev. Father Forger, Ambler, Que.; O. Aubin, M. P. P.; Nipissing; A. A. Mahaffy, J. McDougall, M. P. P.; Ottawa, and H. E. V. Allen, Ottawa.

It is thought that great advertising would be got for Canada from a visit of French, Belgian and German editors.

The Premier is inclined to view the proposition favorably and make a grant to aid the scheme.

WORK OF LIFE-SAVERS

British Coast Guardsmen Rescue Three From French Ship.

London, Oct. 4.—Guardsmen yesterday, after a night and morning of desperate fights, succeeded in throwing a line over the French ship Leon XII which grounded near Seaford, Co. Wick, and rescued three of the crew. A heavy gale blew continuously over the Irish and Welsh coasts.

The crew of 22 were huddled in the bow. They spent a terrible day. Most of the time they clung to the rigging, beaten and numbed by the pitiless seas, before there was a chance to save them.

FACTS ABOUT THE BIG BALL GAMES

Only Two Events Will Be Pulled Off in Detroit, It Is Said.

Inasmuch as nearly everybody in London is talking baseball just at present, the following facts about the coming world's championship series between the Detroit American League team and the Chicago National League nine should prove of interest:

General admission—One dollar. Reserved bleacher seat—One dollar and a half.

Reserved grand stand—Two dollars. The club has already asked the National commission for permission to play the opening games in Chicago, in view of the fact that the arrangements have already been made by the Cubs, which club had time to figure ahead.

The playing schedule will probably be as follows: Tuesday and Wednesday—in Chicago. Thursday and Friday—in Detroit. Saturday in Chicago, if necessary. Sunday in Chicago, if necessary.

Chicago's park will hold 25,000 or 30,000 people, while Bennett Park's capacity will not be over the 15,000 mark.
