THEATRICALS ON STEAMERS Cunard Company Has Accepted Chas Froman's Proposal.

New York, Oct. 3.-It was announced that the Cunard Steamship Company had accepted the offer of Charles Froham to give theatrical perform-Open High Low 2 p.m ances on the big liners by regular players, who may be traveling to and from the United States and England. Alf. Hayman, manager for Chas. Frohman in this city, said today that theaters on ocean liners would prob-895% ably soon be a reality. He continued:

"Mr. Frohman has been thinking of the proposition for some time and is at present in London co-operating with 181/2 the Cunard Company. The scheme will probably be tried first on the Lusit-18% ania. It is not necessarily a moneyfrom continent to continent, their salaries go on just the same and the managers suffer a deficit during that period. By playing to Trans-Atlantic steamship passengers, this deficit would be made up in part.

"Light comedy will be tried at first and, if successful, other branches of theatricals will be put on steamships and, if successful, other branches of boards. Frankly the chief difficulties with the players would probably arise from seasickness, but I suppose, the others would go on and fill the gaps. I cannot tell when the theater on high seas will be put into operation, for some of the details are not definitely settled on."
