ATHLETIC PEACE ARRANGED AT TORONTO

Admits Mixture of Amateurs and Professionals in Senior Lacrosse, But in No Other Sport.

The Toronto Telegram says: The C. A. A. U. at its meeting last night purchased peace from the Federation at a price that is not pleasant to the friends of the former. The governors are strictly silent, but the proceedings of the meeting leaked out all the same.

Terms Accepted.
The terms are all in favor of the Federation, or the Montreal A. A., and the result looks like a purchase of peace by the C. A. A. U. at any price. The articles are to the effect that the C. A. A. U. recognize the mixing of amateurs and professionals in the seven existing clubs in the N. L. U. and in the two in British Columbia—Vancouver and New Westminster. There are no new clubs to be added, nor any new management than that now existing.

Unanimous Vote.
Moreover, this lacrosse agreement between the C. A. A. U. and the Federation is not to be rescinded at any time unless by unanimous vote, which is, of course, out of the question, unless the Montreal A. A. so says. This mixing of amateur and professional is to be in these nine teams only—never in any more at any time, nor is it to be allowed in any other form of sport.

ENGLISH SHOOTERS WON

Prove Superior To Americans in Small Bore Competition.

Washington, May 6.—British rifle-men in the international small-bore match just ended demonstrated their superiority over the Americans by winning an overwhelming victory. The match was a friendly one with small-bore rifles on gallery ranges in the respective countries, the targets were issued by the British Society of Miniature Rifle Clubs, were signed by the respective associations and interchanged, and the results announced by cable.

Australia, the other contestant, has not yet been heard from, but the National Rifle Association of America, under whose auspices the contest was conducted in the United States, is of the opinion that their scores will not equal those of the British team.

The British team made the grand total of 14,433 out of a possible 15,000, or an average of 291 per man. The scores of the American team were 14,179.

A GREAT RIDER

Jockey Taplin Is Expected to Create a Sensation in Canada.

The New York Sun says:
Jockey Taplin, who headed the list of winning riders in California during the winter season, which closed recently, may create a sensation on the local tracks this year, if not in Canada. On the coast he handled 76 winners, 69 seconds and 79 thirds, and was unplaced in 225 mounts. He is said to be remarkably quick at the post, is an excellent judge of pace, and can put up a vigorous finish. He is fearless, and is a natural horseman. Taplin is under contract to H. G. Bevel, whose horses won \$33,520 in California. Taplin will begin riding at Churchill Downs at once.

It is reported that Stanley Ketchell may release his manager, Willis Britt. Ketchell may take part in a ten-round bout at the Fairmont A. Ketchell is making light exercise at his quarters near Wollawarr, but he says he will scale not less than 170 pounds the next time he enters the ring.

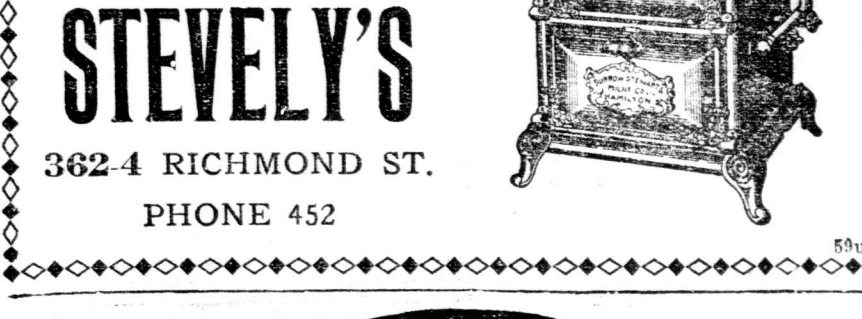

NO BILL AGAINST SHOLTO DOUGLAS

Grand Jury Acquires English Lord Who Shot Trespasser.

Nelson, B. C., May 7. — The grand jury has returned "no bill" in the case of Lord Sholto Douglas, who was charged with shooting with intent to kill James B. Rowlands, a neighbor. The shooting occurred at Creston, where both lived, last September.

Lord Sholto, returning home one day from a hunting trip, it is said, found Rowlands in the house decidedly worse for liquor. Lady Douglas was in the house at the time. Previously to this Douglas had forbidden Row-

lands the house, and had particularly ordered him not to bring in any liquor. On this occasion, it appears, he ordered Rowlands out, but he refused to go, whereupon Douglas went to a neighbor's, got a gun, and returned and shot Rowlands.

The action of the grand jury has been received with a good deal of satisfaction by the people.

WHITNEY OFF TO ENGLAND.

New York, May 6.—Harry Payne Whitney and John Waterbury sailed for England today on the Mauretania, to take part in the international polo match in that country in June. The Americans, who will practice on Hurlingham grounds, will name the date for the polo match.
