DOCTORS WILL ASK FOR A PASTEUR INSTITUTE

Ontario Medical Council Will Also Have Charter Amended.

Toronto, Feb. 3.—The Ontario Medical Council does not intend that any reforms which may be needed in that body shall have to come from outside in the form of legislative enactments to "clip the wings" of the council, as it has been expressed. Certain reforms have already been proposed to the council, and are being seriously considered. They will be submitted to the Government in concrete form as soon as possible.

Drs. E. R. King, of Toronto, Griffin, of Hamilton, Lane, of Mallowtown, in company with Dr. Hardy, of Toronto, the president, forming the executive of the council, waited on the Government yesterday to discuss the situation with the members of the cabinet.

The present method of procedure in the cases of doctors guilty of unprofessional or criminal conduct has for a long time been felt to be one of the weakest spots in the whole administration of the council. As it is today an offender cannot be dealt with till the annual meeting of the council, taking place in July, instructs the discipline committee to investigate his case. Of course, the discipline committee cannot report till the next annual meeting of the council, and the waste of time by these methods is very apparent. The council now wants to arrange things that the executive committee can at any time instruct the discipline committee to take action at once, and report as soon as possible. Offenders can thus be got at once.

Another change that is desired is the division of the western constituency of the council. It extends at present from Kenora to Barrie, and this is felt to be too large. It is hoped to divide this into smaller sections. The establishment of a Pasteur Institute in Ontario will also be asked for. As conditions are at present, every patient suffering from rabies, or in danger of the disease, has to be sent to New York, an expensive and frequently dangerous method of dealing with the malady.

A \$37,000,000 CRASH

New York, Feb. 3.—The Mexican National Packing Company, a New Jersey corporation, controlled by English investors, and operating a string of slaughter houses and packing houses in the Republic of Mexico, under special concessions from the Mexican Government, failed today with liabilities, including stock, of approximately \$37,000,000. The company, which exceeded the liabilities, the company will continue to operate its plants, as usual. Henry Dekay was appointed receiver.

The appointment of a receiver was not brought about by any condition in the live stock market, but by the trying up of part of the company's funds in the United States Banking Company in Mexico City, which suspended recently.

SIR THOMAS DENIES

Montreal, Feb. 3.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R., who returned today from London, gave an emphatic denial to rumors cabled from London that changes were impending in the personnel of the C. P. R. steamship managers of the company. It has been reported that Mr. Arthur Piers, manager of the C. P. R. steamship service, was to resign, and that his place would be taken by Mr. Hugh A. Allan, with the title of fifth vice-president of the C. P. R.

Sir Thomas denied this emphatically, saying that Hugh A. Allan had no connection with the C. P. R., and so far as he knew there was no prospect that he would.

STREET RY. EARNINGS NEARLY QUARTER MILLION

The Annual Report Shows Satisfactory Increases—Officers All Re-Elected.

In the preceding year the gross earnings were \$235,932.40, and 1,505,304 passengers were carried. The increase was a most satisfactory one.

A number of business matters in the shape of extensions and improvements were discussed, but nothing was definitely decided upon.

NEW CHARGE FOR COHEN

Waiter Who Eloped With Heiress Gets Deeper in Mire.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 3.—Another attempt to secure the release from prison of Ferdinand Cohen, the waiter, who is accused of kidnapping Roberta De Janon, the 18-year-old heiress of this city, failed again today, and as a result of the hearing Cohen faces additional serious charges.

Counsel for the waiter made application for his release on a writ of habeas corpus, and after an extended hearing Judge Staake held Cohen in \$1,500 bail on the charges of conspiracy to entice the girl from the custody of her lawful guardian. It is suspected that he and his wife planned the affair to secure money from the girl's relatives.

A telegram was produced by the district attorney, sent by Cohen to his wife, after he and the girl disappeared, in which it was stated that "everything is arranged as to terms." Counsel for the prisoner insisted that the telegram referred to a deal in Texas, in which the wife of the waiter was interested.

Miss De Janon was not in court during the proceedings, but Robert Buist, her wealthy grandfather, was present.

Miss De Janon is reported to have left the city this afternoon, probably for Atlantic City.

SPEND \$75,000 TO STUDY TARIFF

Washington, Feb. 2.—An exhaustive study of the whole subject of the tariff is planned by President Taft. He has directed the tariff board, authorized under the recent tariff act, to prepare for such an inquiry. In order to defray the expenses of the work the President will ask the appropriation of \$75,000 from Congress. Such an investigation of the subject as was recently made by the German Government is sought by the President.

WOULD UNSEAT MAYOR

Toronto, Feb. 2.—Quo warranto proceedings have been instituted at Oshawa to have the election of the mayor and members of the council of Vankleek Hill declared null and void. Mr. Mooney, a ratepayer of the town, alleges various faults in the election proceedings, and also that some members of the council are not qualified to act.

A POLICY DECISION

Toronto, Feb. 2.—Robert Wilson, of Senfort, in 1889 took out a 29-year endowment policy, which matured recently, but the company would not pay till the court settled whether the money was to be paid to Wilson or to a party to whom the policy had been assigned at one time assigned. Today the court decided that the money was to be paid to the assignee, and that the company had discharged the former liability.

Sir Richard Cartwright said the Canadian Government was not blind to the importance of asserting jurisdiction in the regions of the north. It had already dispatched expeditions for that purpose, and was about to send a third. In addition two or three permanent public posts had been established. The question of appointing a superintendent was under consideration.

LAKE BOAT MERGER

Hamilton, Feb. 3.—The consolidation of two of the largest of the great lakes navigation companies in Canada, the Montreal Transportation Company and the Inland Navigation Company, of this city, is a possibility of the next couple of weeks. The Montreal Transportation Company has made an offer to the Inland Navigation Company to take over its stock on a 30 days' option, and auditors are now going over the books of the Inland Company so as to ascertain the value of its stock.

Lent, which is observed with solemnity in Roman Catholic and Protestant Episcopal Churches, begins this year, Feb. 3, which is Ash Wednesday.

WESTERN FAIR BOARD TALKED NEWER GROUND

A Live Question That Will Be Taken Up Seriously in the Near Future.

At a meeting of the directors of the Western Fair Association, subsequent to the general meeting, Mr. W. J. Reid, and the rest of the officers were unanimously elected to the old positions. The officers for the coming year are as follows:

President—Mr. W. J. Reid. First Vice-President—Col. W. J. Little. Second Vice-President—Ald. J. H. Saunders. Secretary—Mr. A. M. Hunt. Treasurer—Mr. J. B. Fitzgerald. Superintendent of Grounds—Mr. Jas. H. Brown. Auditor—Mr. F. G. Jewell. Chairman of the Finance Committee—Mr. George G. McCormick. Chairman of the Grounds and Buildings Committee—Col. J. W. Little. Chairman of the Gates and Tickets Committee—Mr. John Pringle. Chairman of the Printing Committee—Col. W. M. Garthshore. Chairman of the Attractions Committee—Mr. W. J. Reid.

There was no objection whatever to the election of the officers, and the compliments being paid to each one of them.

The secretary, Mr. A. M. Hunt was congratulated upon the success of his efforts, and it was suggested by Mr. W. W. Gammage that a substantial increase in his salary be made. The board will take this up at a subsequent meeting.

Short speeches were made by Mayor Beattie, Ald. Tancook, Ald. Rose and Ald. Pocock.

New Grounds.

The principal topic under discussion was the matter of newer and larger grounds. Some considered the question very remote, but Ald. Pocock thought it was a matter to be taken up immediately. The fair had outgrown the present site, and it was necessary to increase the area. All thought the new grounds should be as near the centre of the city as possible in order to give visitors to the exhibition an opportunity of spending a few hours downtown. The board will also take this matter up in the near future.

New Art Building Needed.

Ald. Rose thought a new art building was a necessity, as was pointed out by Mr. William W. Reid. It could be built at no great cost and would add greatly to the attractiveness of the Western.

Mr. Reid declared that an exhibit of paintings valued at more than \$100,000 could be obtained were there proper accommodation for them. The council will be asked to deal with this matter.

Next Fair Dates.

Mr. A. M. Hunt, the secretary, announced that the dates for the Western were Sept. 9 to 17, and these were found acceptable to the board.

DID RUSSIANS STEAL ALASKA FROM CANADA?

Senator Poirier Thinks So and Wants Government to Inquire Into the Matter.

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—In the Senate on Tuesday, in connection with a suggestion that the United States should appoint a commission charged with the superintendence of the Arctic Islands and the territories over which British and Canadian jurisdiction had recently been asserted by Captain Bernier, Senator Poirier made the statement that recent revelations showed that Russia had stolen Alaska, and the Pacific Coast line. He showed an official Russian document, he said, had recently been found at Sitka, and a Government had been forwarded to the Government-General at St. Petersburg. He said that a Russian officer, in 1826, had been instructed to make a secret expedition to Alaska, and to bury along the coast tablets indicating discovery and possession by Russia at a far earlier date.

In this way Russia was able to establish her claim to Alaska, which was afterwards sold to the United States. With American whalers operating in the Canadian north, on both coasts, Canada should lose no time in securing possession of all the land to which she was entitled. Seven hundred years ago there were flourishing villages in Greenland, and a bishopric in Ungava. The discovery of radioactivity has shaken the theory that all the earth's heat came from the sun. Science, the speaker said, might be full of fertile fields and might be a flourishing population. That change should be anticipated by the securing and continuing in possession of these lands for Canada.

There were indications that the United States could not easily agree to this, or to the closing of Hudson Bay as a Canadian territorial water. Canadian dispute experiences should make her provision in the matter of security.

SOME PAST HISTORY OF WALL STREET POOL

One That Made Huge Profit and Another One That Was a Failure.

New York, Feb. 3.—The disclosures following the collapse of the Rock Island and Hocking Coal manipulations, and the very plain intimation that the stock of the company was to be sold to a number of stock pools, lend interest to the question of how stock pools are formed and operated, says the New York Post.

One of the most interesting pools that ever came to light was the bankers' syndicate formed in 1901 to float the stock of the United States Steel Corporation, received in exchange for the stock of the company. The syndicate assumed by the members of that pool was \$200,000,000. James R. Keene was employed by the pool managers to make a market upon the stock. The pool's holdings could be profitably sold. Within a month the price of the common was advanced from 38 to 55, and the preferred from 82 1/2 to 101 1/2. Presumably, the pool unloaded at the top prices, for the members, instead of putting up \$200,000,000, were called upon for only \$25,000,000, and at \$25 they were able to buy the stock within a year, each member received in cash the original amount advanced, with 200 per cent profit. Within three years the pool had sold at 8 1/2, and the pool was a failure.

A pool of quite another kind was formed in Steel preferred in 1902, when the management undertook to convert the \$200,000,000 7 per cent preferred stock into 5 per cent bonds. The pool was right to convert the stock into bonds was given to a syndicate, the syndicate to buy the stock in the open market at that price, and selling the bonds received in exchange for the stock. At one time the stock was selling in the open market at 49 1/2, while the bonds were quoted at 65. Buying the stock at that price, and selling the bonds received in exchange for the stock, offered the conversion syndicate a profit of 15 points, besides the 4 per cent commission received on the bonds. By the time \$150,000,000 stock had been converted the pool was a failure.

Another pool which developed features out of the ordinary was the one formed by James R. Keene in South Africa, in 1902. Keene and some of his associates formed a pool in Southern Pacific when the stock was selling around 40, and advanced the price to 81 on the theory that E. H. Harriman could not force a dividend on the stock, but Harriman finally declined to play into the pool's hands, and Keene then carried the fight into the courts. Before the long-drawn-out battle was decided in favor of Harriman a flood of Southern Pacific was suddenly turned on the market, which carried the price of the stock below 40, smashing the pool and causing heavy breaking losses to Keene and his associates.

THE SACKVILLE CASE

Letters of Dead Ambassador Bear Out His Contentions.

London, Feb. 2.—Sir Robert Pinley, representing Lord Edward Sackville-West, now Lord Sackville, a nephew of the former British minister at Washington, occupied yesterday's session of the probate court with the introduction of legitimacy of Ernest Henry Sackville-West, who is a petitioner in a suit to have the court declare him the oldest and legitimate son of the late Lord Lionel Sackville-West, and as such to establish his right to the estates now held by Lord Sackville.

Among the papers was a memorandum which the late lord had given to his sister, Lady Derby, in 1881, upon the eve of his departure for Washington, and in which he stated formally that the children of Josefa Duran, including the petitioner, were not legitimate.

There were also letters which the petitioner had written to Lady Derby under date of 1890, in which he said: "Remember we are illegitimate children."

However, in 1896, the contestant changed front and wrote Lord Sackville, demanding public recognition as his legitimate son.

In his reply, which was placed among the exhibits, Lord Sackville stated emphatically that he had never married the petitioner's mother, and that the children of Josefa Duran, including the petitioner, were not legitimate.
