VEGETABLES FEATURE OF THE HOLIDAY MARKET

Potatoes Scarce, and Prices Went Up-Dairy Market One of Largest for Some Time.

The expectations of the buyers and the majority of the farmers were not reached on the local market today, as the weather was such that a large number of the farmers living at a distance from the city were prevented from attending the market. It was expected that the attendance today would exceed that of any other day this season with the exception of Saturdays on account of Saturday being a public

The feature of the day was the large offering of vegetables, and in the majority of cases the prices changed. Potatoes were very scarce, and the quotations were considerably higher than those which prevailed on Tuesday. The majority of sales were made at 95 cents and \$1 per bag, wholesale, and \$1.05 and \$1.10 per bag retail. As a result of the rise in the prices there will be a large offering next week

Vegetables Plentiful.

Lettuce, rhubarb, radishes and aspar agus were plentiful, but the demand was keen and the offerings were largely disposed of before noon. Lettuce was quoted at the same price as prevailed on Tuesday, 40 to 60 cents per dozen, and the supply was somewhat smaller than the demand A number of private buyers had considerable trouble in obtaining a supply, as the grocers had purchased a large quantity early in the day. Rhabarb was firm at 20 cents per dozen, and radishes, although in good demand, were sold at 39 cents per dozen, which was easier than the prices on Tuesday. Cabbages and green onions were in great mand, and the prices advanced slight-Iv. Asparagus was also slightly firmer, the selling prices being 75 and 80 cents per dozen bunches. A few lots of cucumbers were sold, at \$1.50 per dozen.

Hay and Oats.

The supply of hay and oats was small today, and it is expected that a large will be offered on Friday satisfy the demand which is becoming acute. The prices of hay range from \$10 to \$12 per ton, although in one case this morning the selling price was \$12.50; Oats were firm from \$1.08 to
