More Than 20,000 Members Already Enlisted in County-Wide Movement to Aid Sufferers.

As a part of a country-wide movement inaugurated by Lady Ross to raise funds for the maintenance of four motor ambulances at the front, the members of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire have been asked to contribute the sum of 25 cents each. The plan was introduced at a meeting of the Lord Elgin Chapter, held yesterday, and received the hearty indorsement of those present.

The movement is meeting with the hearty co-operation of all of the chapters of the order throughout the country. It was stated that over 100 chapters had already organized for the purpose and that a membership of 20,000 had been enlisted for the cause.

New President of Canadian Club
Splendid Reports Were Heard at Annual Meeting Last Night.

Reports indicating a splendid year's work were received at the annual meeting of the London Canadian Club, held last evening in the Tecumseh House. New officers were elected, as follows: Honorary presidents, Sir Adam Beck, Dr. C. T. Campbell and J. H. Flock, K. C.; honorary vice-presidents, Jared Vining, C. B. Edwards, Frank Glass and T. J. Murphy; past president, A. W. White; president, B. C. McCann; vice-president, Rev. C. Cameron Waller; second vice-president, J. Harry Fowler; secretary, George Copeland; chairman literary committee, Andrew Stevenson; chairman of membership committee, R. V. Pierce; executive, Aid. Ashplant, H. Bapty and President Brathwaite of the Western University auditors, D. H. McDermid and H. Bapty.

Growing Steadily.
The report of Retiring President A. W. White showed that the present membership is 257. He referred to the great loss sustained during the year by the death of two honorary presidents, the late Senator Coffey and the late Major Babb. The club, he said, might be proud of the fact that four of its members are now fighting for the empire, those at Salisbury or the front being Col. A. H. Macdonnell, Lieut. Col. Campbell Becher, Capt. G. N. Weekes and Capt. Harry Greenlees.

President White gave an address on "The Duty, Privileges and Privileges of the Canadian Clubs," emphasizing especially the importance of the "made in Canada" idea during the war, and the necessity of maximum production. The Canadian Clubs, he pointed out, holding their regular luncheons and meetings all over Canada, could accomplish a vast amount of good by working along the lines already adopted by associations, boards of trade and the Government to secure increased production.

Must Construct.
"While the warring nations," he said, "are tearing down, we behind the firing line of the empire must construct. We must pursue our daily task trustfully and with clear foresight and must build foundations for a larger and more prosperous Canada. In doing this we are not only helping ourselves, but other Canadians and the empire, and also humanity to bring about better days in the future of our race."

Patriotism, he declared, not only to the flag, but to commerce, is the best way to unite Canada. Experts, he showed, stated that Canada has been importing too much, sending millions of dollars out of the country that should have built for the country a greater national prosperity. All by buying "made in Canada" goods, he said, we have more goods made at home and keep our money at home. Finance Minister White had declared that the only way to solve the problem of import less, export more and increase production.

A Banner Year.
"I look for this spring to open up the greatest trade year that Canada has ever seen," he said. "And we must be ready to it. If money cannot be had to increase production, the 'made in Canada' cry is futile. Canadians must be ready and have the goods to sell, otherwise the great demand for the coming summer will be supplied from across the border."

"The greatest factor in the nation's capital is confidence. The nation with confidence must be ready to create this by the 'get together' system, Canadian Clubs, farmers' associations and similar organizations."

Many of the members of the club thought the president's address should be printed and sent all over Canada. Mr. Andrew Stevenson, however, said that he wished to protest against the Canadian Club placing itself on record as backing up a Canadian manufacturer's proposition. President White stated that his address had absolutely nothing whatever to do with the Canadian manufacturers, but with conditions as he had found them.

It was finally decided to have the address printed.
Letters of appreciation will be sent to the four members of the club now at the front. Secretary Copeland's report showed that the club has, during the year, given \$420 to the patriotic fund, Belgian relief and I.O.E. It was decided to make every effort to increase the membership, and two luncheons, at which prominent speakers will be present, will be arranged for at once. It is planned to hold evening sessions, at which many young businessmen, unable to get away at other times, will be able to attend.

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HUGE GERMAN GUN BLOWN TO PIECES

British Artillery "Gets" It Before It Is Placed In Position.

(Canadian Press.)
St. Omer, France, Jan. 25, via Paris, Jan. 26.—The heavy artillery of the British has destroyed an enormous gun which the Germans were placing on a hill about a mile behind their first line of trenches and about two miles from the coast, with the object of silencing the English howitzers and bombarding Bethune.

The position of the big gun was marked by a British aviator, and the fourth shell from the British guns demolished it.
The British gunners then directed their fire on a group of German artillerymen engaged in placing a similar gun a mile further behind, scattering them with a few well-aimed shells. They also smashed three pumps brought up by the Germans to empty water out of their trenches.

The following message was received by the Old Dominion line from Captain Nelson, of the Hamilton:
"A wireless report received here this morning said that the schooner in collision with the Washingtonian was the Elizabeth Palmer and that the crew of both the steamer and the schooner had been rescued by the Hamilton."

The Washingtonian is a freighter and carried no passengers, according to reports of the line. Her crew usually consists of 45 men. She lies between San Francisco and New York by way of the Panama Canal, the trip requiring about 20 days.
Officials of the line had received no word of her plight this morning.

ONE REPORTED DROWNED.
(Canadian Press.)
Nortfolk, Va., Jan. 26.—A radiogram received at the Norfolk navy yard this morning stated that the Washingtonian had been rammed and sunk and that one person was drowned. It said thirty-eight persons were rescued by lights No. 72. The remainder of the Washingtonian's crew are believed to have been rescued by the Hamilton.

Chocolate Bread Pudding.
