

**JUDGMENT RESERVED
IN PORTE WILL CASE**

WINDSOR, Oct. 27.—County Judge Coughlin this afternoon at Sandwich reserved judgment in the suit brought to set aside the will of Joseph Porte, who died two years ago, leaving an estate valued at \$50,000. The property includes the West Side Hotel, West Sandwich street, which is tenanted by Edward and E. Maronette, to whom Porte willed a considerable portion of his estate. Applications for an order to quash the will contend that Porte was mentally deficient when he signed his last will.

**SWITZERLAND HAS
VERY LITTLE RAIN****Unprecedented Drought Be-
gan More Than Year Ago.**

BERNE, Oct. 27.—There has been no rain worth mentioning throughout Switzerland since August, and the drought which began a year ago still continues. In some places the water supply is cut off at night, and the Lausanne authorities have warned the public not to waste any water.

Forest fires are again reported—something unprecedented at this season. The woods on the Harder Mountain above Interlaken have been ablaze for the last two days, and the population has been working day and night to extinguish the fire, but unsuccessfully.

The Rhine has not been so low for a century, and navigation for boats with deep draught is impossible. Hundreds of boats are stuck in the river mud, and perishable goods must be promptly unloaded. Normally great quantities of heavy goods, such as coal and grain and building materials, are transported by the Rhine, and unless copious rainfalls and snowfalls come before long a shortage of electric power is feared.

The inhabitants of both banks of the Rhine suffer particularly from the prolonged drought, because it so greatly interferes with cheap water transport.

In all churches prayers for rain are being offered.

CHRISTOPHER ANDREWS DIES.

INGERSOLL, Oct. 27.—Christopher Andrews, for 50 years a resident of this town, died at the family residence, Alma street, following an extended illness. He was in his 70th year, and was born in Cambridgeshire, England. He came to this country at the age of 20 years, and with the exception of a short period spent in the United States had resided here ever since. He leaves a widow, three sons and three daughters.

**Rev. R. B. Cockrane Defends
Church Matrimonial Agency****Declares That Church Is Where Young People Should Get
To Know Each Other—Religious Education Con-
ference Closed.**

BRANTFORD, Oct. 27.—Dr. Marion Lawrence delivered a magnificent oration this evening on "The Challenge of the Sunday School," and closed the annual convention of the Ontario Religious Education Council, the best in its history, both for attendance and inspiration. Sessions were held all day, and the delegates were given many valuable suggestions for Sunday school work.

This morning at the general session Prof. F. Langford appealed for the erection of the family altar and Bible reading in the homes. Rev. R. B. Cockrane of College Street Presbyterian Church, Toronto, pleaded for the young people. "No person was ever brought to Christ with the inducement that he might thereby save himself from hell," he commented, urging that

the Christian church be bright and cheery.

"I have been accused of running a matrimonial agency in my church," said Mr. Cockrane. "Why not? That is where they should get to know each other."

A promotion work conference followed, divided into sections by years. These continued this afternoon, with rural and city divisions afterwards. There was much discussion on the work among the rural young folks. It had been found hard to get the young men to summer camps, and it was suggested that log cabin winter camps be tried out, as the young men could then attend.

This evening Rev. J. Stuart Mills spoke on "Developing the Superman," and Dr. Marion Lawrence's talk closed the gathering and the convention.

**BURNING WASTE CAUSE
OF FIRE IN BLENHEIM**

Howard Township Farmer Loses Barns
And Crops in Blaze.

BLENHEIM, Oct. 27.—Fire broke out in one of the barns belonging to Walter McGee east of here, on the Morpeth road, Howard Township, and destroyed both his large barn and the season's crop, including about 35 tons of hay, 13 acres of beans, 400 bushels of oats and nearly all his farm implements. Only a small insurance was carried.

One of Blenheim's best business blocks narrowly escaped being destroyed by fire Tuesday morning, between 8 and 9 o'clock. One of the clerks employed in a store had, it is stated, been burning some paper waste in the yard at the rear of the store, as has been the custom. Shortly afterwards an adjoining storekeeper, entering his store by the back way, noticed that some loose paper blown by the wind against the oil building, a small wooden shed, had set it on fire.

As soon as the alarm was given the extinguishers in the store were put into use, and aided by a bucket brigade, kept the fire under control until the fire engine, which the operators had some difficulty in starting, was working and the firemen got a stream going. The oil building and the adjoining storeroom were badly burned, and the stock inside injured either by fire or water, but no damage was done to the main building.

**GALT TORIES AND LABOR
OPEN THEIR CAMPAIGN**

Both Meetings Draw Crowds—Liberals
To Select Candidate.

GALT, Oct. 27.—It is doubtful at present whether the Liberal party in South Waterloo will have a candidate in the coming Dominion election or not. At an adjourned meeting of the executive held this afternoon the political situation was thoroughly discussed, and a decision reached to hold the party convention in about three weeks' time for reorganization purposes.

The federal campaign in this constituency was launched tonight with two candidates in the field, S. F. Scott, Government, and Wm. Elliott, U.F.O.-Labor, both of whom held meetings here. That of the former at the theatre drew a large crowd, the speakers being Hon. J. A. Stewart, minister of railways; Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, and Mr. Scott.

The people's Progressive party meeting was held at the city hall, the auditorium of which was filled. Hon. Harry Mills, minister of mines in the Ontario cabinet, and K. K. Homuth, M.P.P. for South Waterloo, were principal speakers. The latter challenged any Meighen cabinet minister to meet him on the platform in debate.

**FOREIGN COLONIES IN
EGYPT FEAR FUTURE****May Lose Long-Enjoyed
Privileges by Home Rule.**

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Oct. 27.—Foreign businessmen in Egypt are suffering somewhat sleepless nights of late as a result of the uncertainty surrounding the negotiations now taking place in London between the British Foreign Office and the Egyptian delegation headed by Adly Yegen Pasha, the prime minister, a body opposed by the Nationalists, who are led by Zaghlul Pasha, a strong advocate of "home rule."

Foreign commercial, banking and shipping firms are watching developments closely and, while they sympathize, it is said, with the aspirations of the Egyptians for self-government, they do not relish the thought of the possible cessation of courts applying European law which in the past has meant security for their business and protection for their families.

The Americans in Egypt at present enjoy freedom from taxation, the right to be tried in criminal cases by the American Consular courts and recourse in civil actions to the International Mixed courts, in which America is represented by three American judges. While the American colony in Egypt is small, it takes no active part or interest in local politics, it would not agree that the Washington Government relinquish any of the rights and privileges its members now enjoy.

There are two parties among the Egyptians—the Nationalists, headed by Saad Zaghlul, for three years now the leader of the masses, and the Government, or Moderate party, led by Adly Yegen. Zaghlul conducted the first negotiations with Lord Milner's commission. The foreign office in London has insisted that the Milner project, which guaranteed certain rights of self-government, be embodied in a treaty agreed upon by the British and Egyptian Governments.

The Nationalists replied that no treaty acceptable to the people would be possible until martial law was abolished. The English protectorate formally withdrawn and a delegation be elected by the people to negotiate a treaty. A delegation composed of ministers and headed by Adly Yegen, without any representation for Zaghlul and his followers, was appointed by the sultan and proceeded to London to arrange the treaty.

The Nationalists, it is declared, will oppose in every way any treaty made by this delegation, and this may mean a renewal of party strife. Should the delegation return from the conference dissatisfied the Egyptian nation again may be united against the English and

**Ram Proves An Efficient
Guard For Chestnut
Trees.**

QUART, Oct. 27.—That a ram is fully as efficient as a watchdog in guarding the part of the farm allotted to him was proven on Sunday, when three young men from the village sought chestnuts on a neighboring farm. Knowing the fighting qualities of the animal the proprietor of the farm pastured him in the field where the chestnuts grow.
