

FIELDING ABLY PAVES PATH OF VICTORY FOR BUDGET IN STIRRING PLEA TO COMMONS

Slashes Tax On Sugar Beet Industry, To Aid Western Ontario, From Original 49 Cents to 24 Cents Per Hundred Pounds—Exempts Candy Retailed At Less Than 10 Cents a Package—Reduces Levies On Telegrams, Checks, Stock Transfers and Automobiles.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, Ottawa, June 12.—Heeding the plea of those upon whom the new taxes in the budget weighed most heavily, Hon. W. S. Fielding, Canada's minister of finance, lightened the load tonight, when he announced many changes and modifications in the fiscal policy of the budget.

It was a fiery speech that came from the lips of the finance minister, and one that surely paved the way to victory, when the vote on the budget was taken on Tuesday night. For as he spoke he was applauded continuously by the Liberals, and often by the Progressives.

For the most part Mr. Fielding directed his words at the Progressive party. Fearlessly and honestly, he laid bare the tariff policy of the government. He granted them no further reductions for which they clamored, but he told them the step he had taken was one in the right direction, and should be considered a final one.

The Liberal party, he said, has never stood for protection, and it did not stand for protection now. The government, however, while making a revision downward, sought to avoid a serious disturbance of business. It was a policy that the Progressives last year declared themselves in favor of, and if the Progressive party was in power he felt sure it would do nothing different than the government had done.

He reiterated his stand on reciprocity with the United States. Much has been heard of it, he said, and more would be heard about it again. While he felt that golden opportunity was lost in 1911, he assured the house that the Liberal government would give a sympathetic ear to the Americans if they approached Canada again in the spirit of 1919.

Aids Sugar Industry.
Mr. Fielding made concessions to the sugar beet trade to save the industry in Western Ontario. He slashed the tax from the original 49 cents to 24 cents on every 100 pounds.

He heeded the cry of the children, and exempted all candy retained at less than 10 cents a package from the proposed tax of 5 cents.

The tax on automobiles was readjusted to lighten the burden of cars of more than \$1,200, which were hit rather hard by the original tax.

Modifications in the check stamp tax were made to aid business. They will meet with general approval in all parts of the country, for it was

Windsor Man Held In Death of Ohio War Veteran Found In Alley

WINDSOR, June 12.—Edward Campeau, 131 Aylmer avenue, Windsor, has been arrested and another man is being sought, following an investigation by Windsor police into the death of Charles Sauer, an inmate of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home of Sandusky, O., whose body was found in an alley between Gienarry and Aylmer avenues, May 7.

When Sauer was found by the police his shoes lay beside him. It was thought that he had died from the effects of poisonous liquor, but an examination of his stomach failed to disclose the presence of any injurious agent. A coroner's jury later turned in a verdict of death by suffocation.

Windsor police say that Campeau made a statement that he and the man being sought had become intoxicated with Sauer in Campeau's basement. Later, according to the alleged statement, Campeau and the other man went out. When Campeau returned alone, he found Sauer apparently insensible and, unable to arouse him, placed him in the alley, police say they were told.

\$4.70 and 25 per cent. Prior to May 23, the duty on cigarettes was \$4.10 and 25 per cent.

Two of the tariff items included relate to paper used in the publication of magazines, newspapers and periodicals published regularly. There is no change in the rates under the two items, but there are changes in the descriptions. The "paper called 'enlarged' papers is shifted from the item bearing duties ranging from 17½ to 35 per cent and placed in that bearing duties from 12½ to 25 per cent.

Two other tariff changes relate to materials used in the manufacture of hats. "Hatters' plush" is removed from item 638A, which is part of the free list, and is placed in item 1029, which provides for a drawback of 39 per cent of the duty.

The tax on beet sugar is reduced from 49 cents to 24½ cents per 100 pounds.

Exempts Fertilizers.
Fertilizers and dried beet pulp are added to the list of articles exempted from the sales tax.

The alteration made in the government's policy regarding imports from countries where the currency is depreciated consists in the adoption of a clause providing that "the value for duty shall not be less than the value that would be placed on similar goods produced in the United Kingdom; if similar goods are not produced in the United Kingdom, the value for duty shall not be less than the value of similar goods imported from any European country in which the currency is not substantially depreciated."

A new provision is adopted as regards the export of wines and spirituous liquors. It is enacted that the exporter "shall give security by bond in double the duties of importation on such goods that the same shall, when the entry aforesaid is for exportation by sea, be actually exported to the place provided for in such entry, and when the entry aforesaid is for exportation by land or inland navigation shall be landed and delivered at the place for which they are entered 'outwards.' This provision does not apply to wines and spirituous liquors in transit through a Canadian port from a port outside Canada to another destination outside Canada.

Analyzes Criticism.
Mr. Fielding's announcement was preceded by an analysis of criticisms of his financial proposals made both by and without the house. He spoke feelingly of the many kind things said of him during the debate, in what he put it, "might be called the evening of my career." Progressives had argued that the budget was all right so far as it went, but that it did not go far enough.

"But then," Mr. Fielding dryly added, "we must learn that we cannot in all things have our own way." All political matters were essentially matters of compromise. "This was no time for radical changes. It was a time for caution and moderation, for seeking to take into consideration the interests of the whole country."

On the other hand, Conservatives had charged that the changes in the tariff were microscopic. "I hope," Mr. Fielding went on, "they will tell the same story when they go back to the manufacturers of the country."

As to the Drayton amendment to the budget, Mr. Fielding took the view that Conservatives should do more than indulge in "mere nagging and scolding." Nobody expected the budget to comply rigidly with the Liberal platform of 1919.

Should Back Budget.
Progressives took the ground that the budget should go much further. All political matters were a compromise, however, and it was only by compromise that government was carried on. Progressives had said that the proposal contained in the budget was a step in the right direction, and if this was the case they should give the government their support.

Last year the Progressives, then a much smaller group, had supported a resolution submitted by the then Liberal opposition, calling for a downward revision of the tariff. The present budget was a step in the direction. He commended it to the Progressives, not as a finality, but good as far as it went.

Mr. Fielding then ventured the prediction that had the Progressives been the largest group in the house, they would have been obliged to bring forward a budget substantially the same as that before the house. They would have realized that it was a time for moderation and caution, not for drastic changes; re-

sponsibility had a sobering effect.

Mr. Fielding referred to the increased sales tax. Last year this tax had realized some \$60,000,000; this year, it was expected to bring in from \$90,000,000 to \$100,000,000. The Progressives had opposed it, but their leader had not put anything forward to take its place. True, a land tax and inheritance taxes had been suggested by some of Mr. Fielding's followers, but Mr. Fielding reminded the house that the country had not at present the machinery for collecting a land tax, and as far as for the inheritance tax, "death was sure, but sometimes it was very, very slow." There was no surety that any large sum would be realized from such a tax at the time when large sums were needed.

Seeks New Revenue.
"Whoever stands in my place next year," said Mr. Fielding, "may have to find new means of getting money with which to run this country, and he may have to bring back the sales tax if we were to do away with it now."

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen and Sir Henry Drayton, criticizing the budget from the Conservative benches, had said that the changes made were hardly worth mentioning. Mr. Fielding hoped they would tell the same story to the manufacturers when they went amongst that class. The house, however, had an inkling of what Mr. Meighen would say. He had told the member for Brantford (W. G. Raymond) that the changes would result in the workmen of Brantford walking about in idleness. Two and one-half per cent was often considered a serious alteration to make, Mr. Fielding declared.

As for symptoms of alarm, however, they were needless. Manufacturers were easily alarmed. In 1896 the minister of finance remembered having been visited by a deputation of bankers who had pleaded with him not to touch the tariff at all, because the interests of bankers, manufacturers and working people were so interwoven. "We did make changes, however," he said, "and it will be admitted that instead of being ruined, the country flourishing for years after 1896."

been sorry."

As to the economic situation, he pointed out that there was a race going on between the mark and prices and wages. At present the mark was ahead, but there would come a rise of prices again, and when the time came for deflation there would be no such flourishing condition as had been represented.

Criticized Own Party.

Mr. Baxter had said that there could be no agreement with Germany, but in that he was criticizing his own party, which had agreed to the treaty of Versailles and waived a million dollars to get the assent of the Canadian Parliament, "an act about as useful as a fifth wheel to a coach." He personally was not anxious to trade with Germany, but as a nation Canada had no right to legislate to prevent it.

He remarked that Hon. H. H. Stevens had agreed that the rate of 50 per cent on par was too high, and had suggested a rate of 35 per cent. He reminded Mr. Stevens that the 50 per cent rate was discriminating against Italy, too, and Italy was an ally. The 50 per cent rate doubled the value of the Italian lire.

"My suggestion would help Italy," interjected Mr. Stevens.

Coming to the sales tax, Mr. Fielding asked how Canada was to meet her obligations without increased taxation. Why, then, stir up the people against the sales tax by saying that it affected 100 per cent of the people? As a matter of fact there were large exemptions from the sales tax and those exemptions had been increased this year.

Every Change Downward.

Mr. Fielding protested against calling the budget a protectionist budget. Every change proposed was downward, he said. If he was asked if this was the situation, he could only answer that there was no finality in politics. The house could see the direction the government proposed to take.

Mr. Fielding went on to say that Canada lost nothing through the system of "drawbacks" pursued by the customs department. As far as drawbacks on sugar were concerned, the country merely assessed a cargo of sugar at its highest value when it arrived, and then refunded to the importer the amount to which he was entitled when the grade and quality of the sugar were ascertained. He explained that the duty on sugar was figured on the grade and quality of the product. Complaint had been made of the drawbacks paid to the Ford Company on goods shipped out of the country. This company imported raw material, paid the duty on it, and manufactured it into the customs product. It received a refund of the duty on goods which were shipped out of the country. It was merely a business transaction, and Canada lost nothing through it. The system had been in practice for a hundred years, and would be for a hundred more.

Was Mere Scolding.

The amendment to the budget Mr. Fielding characterized as "mere nagging and scolding." He did not think that the Liberal platform of 1919 had carried much weight in the last election. He had not mentioned it in his constituency. Only members of the Conservative party had stressed it in the campaign. The real fact was that the people of Canada had made up their minds that they didn't want Tory rule. "We'll take all chances rather than have the Meighen government," they said.

Mr. Fielding then announced his proposed modifications.

LONDON, England, June 12.—Twelve British soldiers have been massacred by the Turks in the neighborhood of the Dardanelles, according to a semi-official dispatch from Athens received here tonight.

The men were taken prisoner during a raid by Kemal's bands on a weak British detachment.

Outlines Modifications In Liberal Budget.

OTTAWA, June 12.—Hon. W. S. Fielding, in outlining to the House of Commons tonight the proposed budget modifications, announced:

Confactionary tax not to apply to goods ready for sale in cartons at less than ten cents per carton.

Soft drinks tax broadened so as to take in soda fountain man. Tax reduced from ten cents to five cents. Ale, beer, porter, stout tax to be 12½ cents a gallon.

Beet sugar tax reduced from 49 cents to 24 cents on every hundred pounds.

Cigarette tax to be \$7.50 per thousand.

Stamp tax on checks the maximum to be \$2. Tax will be 2 cents for every \$50 up to \$5,000. Tax on receipts similar to English tax. Up to \$10 exempt, and 2 cents over that amount.

Cigars tax on cheaper lines reduced; medium-priced cigars remain as at present and higher-priced cigars will be increased.

Automobiles will be taxed 5 per cent on all automobiles up to \$1,200, and 10 per cent on automobiles over that amount. All bonafide sales of automobiles up to May 23 are exempt of tax.

Tax on cables and telegrams reduced from five to three cents.

Tax on stock transfers cut from five to three cents.

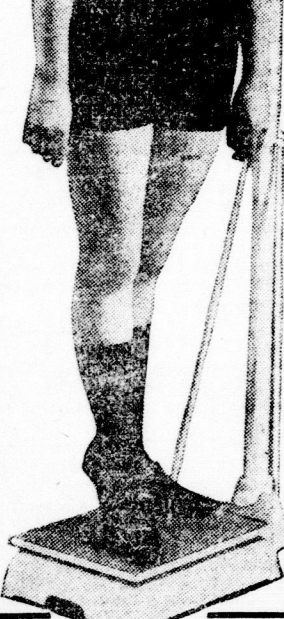
