W. I. CONVENTION DATES ANNOUNCED

Preparations For Western Ontario Conference Shadowed by Loss of Mrs. D. C. Wilson.

The annual convention of Western Ontario Women's Institute branches will be held in London on Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 and 2, according to announcement of the provincial president, Mrs. George Edwards of Komoka, who arrived in the city Thursday after attending the first meeting of the autumn of the provincial executive in Toronto. A meeting is called for Thursday next, Sept. 14, in the chamber of commerce board room of the convention executive committee to make arrangements for the program and to transact other business.

The Northwest Ontario convention takes place at Port Francis on Oct. 10 and 11; the North Ontario at North Bay on the 17th and 18th; the Ontario East in Ottawa on Oct. 24th and 25th. The day of the provincial convention in Toronto has not yet been fixed, beyond the fact it will follow up in November the division conventions. If possible, it will be arranged during the week of the Royal Winter Fair.

Mrs. Edwards expressed herself as much encouraged over the reports presented and spirit manifested at the executive meeting. "I do not think the outlook for the work has ever been better, or a finer spirit of unity prevailed throughout Ontario," she stated to The Advertiser. "There is one thing, however, which is shadowing us all and saddening us at this time of preparation for the Western Ontario convention. That is the loss of our dear Mrs. D. C. Wilson of Parkhill, a loss to the Institute throughout Ontario, but especially to Western Ontario and North Middlesex. Personally, as well as on behalf of the Institute, I want to thank the Women's Department of The Advertiser for the sympathetic little sketch of her life and work and the loving tribute paid her a few days ago. We all echo it from our hearts."

Clusters of asters tied with tulle marked the guest pews.

Entering the church promptly at 6:30 o'clock to the strains of the Bridal Chorus from Lohengrin, played by Mrs. Hugh McFarlane of Sault Ste. Marie, the wedding party presented a charming picture. Leading the procession were two dainty flower girls, little Miriam McCrimmon, in pale blue georgette, and Marian Ferguson, wearing pale pink crepe de chine. They both wore girdles of tiny rosebuds and wreaths in their hair, and carried baskets of Sweetheart roses.

Not Yet Satisfied With Plan for Court

The juvenile court continued to be a topic for interested discussion at the meeting of this week of the Women's Labor party, presided over by the president, Mrs. Fred White. Having taken an active part in the campaign for the establishment of a court to deal with juvenile delinquents, general gratification was expressed that at last definite action has been taken by the city council. At the same time, officers and members were unanimous in holding to the opinion that, in the best interests of the young people to be dealt with in the court, a separate juvenile court judge should be appointed.

The objection they expressed to the arrangement of the city council, whereby the police magistrate exercises also the function of juvenile court judge, was that both public and young offenders will be inclined to associate the juvenile institution with police court and procedure in connection with crime. One of the chief objects in establishing the court, they claimed, was to entirely dissociate the work from police court.

Weekly meetings will not be resumed until after the exhibition, these to be inaugurated on the evening of Sept. 20.
